in earnest if necessary.

Those who are in the habit of speeding or otherwise breaking the vehicle laws or taking things that do not belong to them, need not blame the county if they get into serious difficulties.

The Board of Supervisors is determined that lawlessness and crime shall cease in this county as far as they can prevent it, and the State's

Attorney has been instructed to punish to the limit anyone whether a citizen of this county or of another county who is caught, breaking the law.

Watch HOW you step. The matter of the appointing of a successor to County Superintendent of Schools Bowman was broached, but because Mr. Bowman's resignation does not take effect until July it was decided to await action.

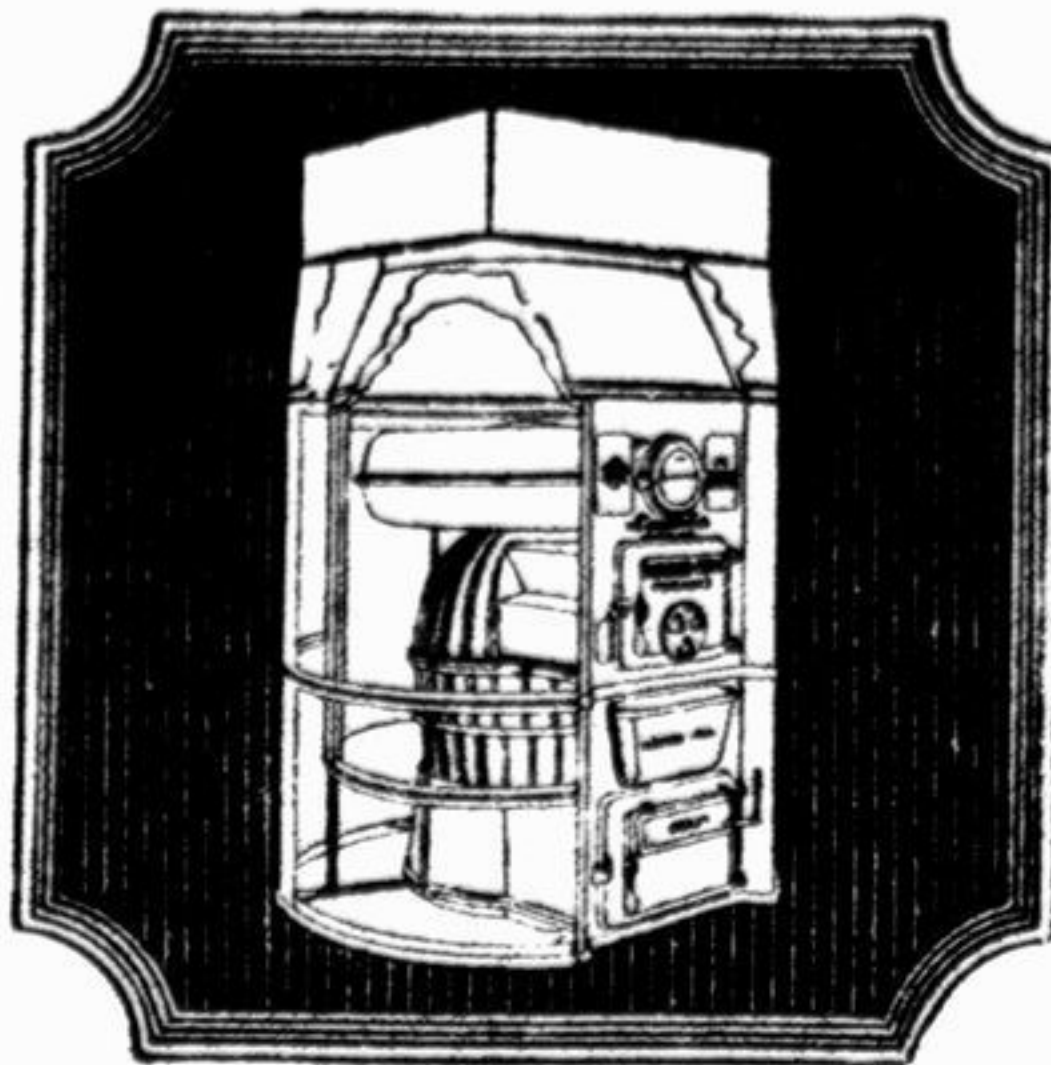
