

BERWYN LOST TO LEGION TEAM IN SWATFEST SUNDAY

"Hogger" Jorgenson of D. G. H. S. Fame Unable to Keep Locals From Slugging.

Last Sunday's game proved to be another easy victory for the local American Legion team when Berwyn gave them battle but were unable to do much with Ehninger's pitching...

The visitors had in their lineup two former Downers players, "Hogger" Jorgenson, pitching, and "Red" Jorgenson, playing first base. The team is a fastfielding, hard hitting aggregation but "Hogger's" pitching proved unequal to holding the local sluggers.

Ehninger disposed of the first three men to face him in short order and Downers started scoring right away, which is their usual custom with such strong batters as Carpenter, Mochel, Herb Ehninger and Binder heading the batting order.

Berwyn came right back in the 2d and put two runs across on two hits and an error. Gubbins singled and scored on Selig's hit to Hawkins who fumbled the ball. Stool flied out.

The locals put the game on ice in their half by some heavy hitting and loose playing by Berwyn. Cline flied to left; Bruns walked and stole second; Hawkins struck out; Bruns scored on Carpenter's single thru the pitcher; Mochel hit over second putting Carpenter on third and Johnny made second on the play.

The visitors threatened to score in the third on errors by Carpenter and Mochel but Binder killed their chances by a double play. Downers put two more runs across when Cline caught hold of a fast one for three bases to left center and scored on a passed ball; Bruns was an easy out; Hawkins walked and stole second; Carpenter hit to center and was safe on the error; Hawkins tried for third and was out; Carpenter scored on Mochel's single to right; Mochel out stealing.

Berwyn went out in order in the fourth and the locals failed to score although Ehninger singled.

Cline went to first and Bruns to center field to start the fifth. Berwyn scored four runs on some clean hitting and errors. This was the only inning that Herb was in real trouble although he whiffed three. Jorgenson was safe at first on a hard chance to Binder; Rudderham struck out; McCauley beat out a hit to Mochel; Red Jorgenson bunted to Ehninger and beat the throw. Three on base and one out. Gubbin's single scored Jorgenson and Rudderham; Gubbins stole second; Selig hit to left and scored McCauley and Red Jorgenson; Selig went to third on a passed ball; Stool and Bliss struck out. 4 runs.

Downers came right back and put two more runs across in the fifth. Cline walked and stole second and scored on Bruns' fluke home run to left, the ball being lost in the grass near the creek; June Ehninger struck out; Carpenter hit to right and stole second; Mochel walked; Herb struck out and Binder tapped to first.

Berwyn could do nothing in the sixth three flies to the outfield being the extent of their efforts. Red Jorgenson went to center and Gubbins to the box for Berwyn and being a left hander had the locals guessing. Nash walked; Klein struck out; Cline bunted and was out; Nash out stealing.

Two hits in the seventh failed to put any tallies across for Berwyn. Nash threw Jorgenson out stealing and Stool and Bliss struck out. Gubbins got his cross fire to working for Berwyn getting three strikeouts, Carpenter getting on thru an error.

Stair went to the rubber for Downers in the eighth and Ehninger to center but Berwyn could do nothing at bat. Willis, pinch-hitting for Downs, walked but the next three were easy outs.

The Legion team put another run over in the eighth bringing their total

to fourteen. Herb hit thru third and Brick slammed one out to right. Nash came thru with a pretty sacrifice. Klein hit to Gubbins and was out. Cline was safe on an error and Herb scored.

Berwyn got two hits in the ninth but failed to score. Red Jorgenson singled to center and stole but was caught napping. Stair to Binder. Gubbins struck out. Selig hit to left for two bases and Stool struck out.

The warm weather has put the locals in trim and Manager Binder is having a hard time getting teams in their class. But few local people realize that the American Legion team is capable of putting up a game of ball that is on a par with some of the best on the Chicago semi-pro lots. If Downers had an enclosed field they would have little trouble getting semi-pro clubs out to play. However the manager is doing his best to secure teams of class and promises a fast game next Sunday.
