OPEN AIR SUNDAY EVENING MEETINGS JULY AND AUGUST

Pastors Met Saturday Evening to Discuss Plans for Union Outdoor Services.

The "Co-Operative Council of the Downers Grove Churches" met on last Saturday evening to discuss plans for the holding of open air services in the village during the months of July and August.

One of the innovations this year will be that all outside speakers will be secured to address the audiences. In past years, while two or three outside speakers were heard, the usual procedure was for local men to deliver the sermons. This phase was adopted after considerable discussion. A director of music to direct the combined choirs will also be secured.

The program committee shall consist of the five pastors: the Rev. Wm. Grotefeld, the Rev. J. Alfred Nansen, the Rev. Gilbert H. Newland and the Rev. A. S. Phelps and the Rev. Arnold Kehrel. These men shall arrange for the speakers, secure a song leader and fix on the order of services.

The place for holding the services has been changed from the street between the Library and the Congregational Church to the Methodist Church lawn. This is much the better location in one way as it gets away from the noise of the trains somewhat but the usual procession of automobiles along Maple avenue in the summer will make up for the trains.
