

MANY VISITORS AT GROVE LODGE LAST SATURDAY

Masons From Forty-Seven Different Lodges Attend Long Session With Much Work.

Grove Lodge No. 824, A. F. & A. M., held a long session last Saturday when the Master Mason Degree was conferred on a class of seven candidates, the limit under Masonic law. Work started at ten o'clock in the morning and a regular schedule was followed throughout the day with recesses for meals.

Representatives from forty-seven different lodges were present during the ceremonies, the visiting craftsmen exemplifying the degree work. In the evening the Trowel Club, all members of the Union Trust Co. Bank, of Chicago, took charge of the work and put through one of their number whose home is in the Grove. It may be interesting to know that twelve employees of that institution now make Downers Grove their home.

Supper, served by the Ladies' Aid of the Congregational Church, was enjoyed by more than 125, the largest number at any like gathering in the history of the local lodge. Ending up with strawberry shortcake, it was a meal to be remembered.

As the members of the lodge were called to order after the evening meal, John Jenkins, W. M., welcomed the visiting brethren and introduced Deputy Grand Master Haller, of the 17th Masonic District. Brother Haller made a short but interesting talk on the Universality of Masonry telling of the first lodge organized in Alaska during the gold rush in '98. Ricardo Bonillo, a native Filipino and a member of Malinaw Lodge No. 25, San Pablo, P. I., was then introduced. He told of the introduction of Masonry into the Islands, of the Grand Lodges under which the local bodies work and a little of the degree work as exemplified there. An exponent of self-rule for his people, he told of strides they had made under the wing of Uncle Sam, contrasting present day progress with the lack of it under the three hundred year rule of Spain. With him was his partner, Mauricio Fule. Both of them are studying in Chicago schools, one taking up mechanical engineering and the other, law.

The entire day was one of the best in the annals of Grove Lodge.

DU PAGE COUNTY INVITED TO GLEN ELLYN MAY 30TH

Ex-Senator James Ham. Lewis Speaks At Memorial Day Services in the Morning.

All of DuPage County has been invited to attend the Memorial Day celebration at Glen Ellyn next Monday, at which former Senator James Hamilton Lewis will be the chief speaker.

The invitation to all towns in the county has been issued by the newly organized Glen Ellyn Community Club, which plans to make this an occasion which shall show the veterans of the Civil War that DuPage County "has not forgotten."

It was DuPage that sent more men to the Civil War than any other county in the state. Yet, within the year, E. S. Kelly Post, with headquarters at Wheaton, has been forced to abandon its charter because there did not remain sufficient members to fill the roster of officers.

With the passing of Kelly Post a few of the veterans are inclined to feel that their solidarity as an organization has been broken.

To keep them together—to show them that the younger generations will carry on the work that they started when Memorial Day was established—the Community Club, cooperating with the American Legion and civic organizations, has made the program for this year one of surpassingly high standard.

More than five thousand visitors from other towns are expected. The program will start at 10 o'clock in the morning with a parade, in which 500 veterans of the world war will act as escort of honor for the Civil War veterans. A full military band, with a community chorus will share the program with Senator Lewis.

WHAT LAWS DO DU PAGE COUNTY FARMERS FAVOR

Sixteen Questions on National Agricultural Legislation to be Sent Out.

Farmers of the DuPage County Farm Bureau and the other 1,600 county farm bureaus in the United States are to be asked within the next few weeks their opinion on sixteen questions of national agricultural legislation. The answers from a million and a half farmers are to be used as a basis for the national agricultural legislative problem of the American Farm Bureau Federation at Washington. The Illinois Agricultural Association will help each Illinois county farm bureau to get the opinion of its members. The sixteen questions concern matters of freight rates, farm loans, waterways, farm taxes, farm finance, country roads, and other matters of interest to farmers. It is the first time in agricultural history that an attempt has been made to learn the wishes of each individual in an organization comprising as many as a million and a half farmers.

Members of the DuPage County Farm Bureau, who sent a delegation of six farmers to Springfield several weeks ago in support of the Lantz bills to regulate the Chicago Board of Trade received word last week that the first and most important of the two bills had passed the Senate 26 to 22. This bill, if passed by the House and signed by the Governor will put grain exchanges under fair and open regulation of the public and will allow farmers to have a voice in the marketing of their own product.

Every Chicago Senator voted against the bills. Only three down-state Senators voted against them: Glenn, of Murphysboro; Hicks, of Rockford; and Dailey, of Peoria. Glenn and Dailey had been for the bill until the final vote. Three down-state Senators were absent: Swift, whose child was dead; Turnbaugh, who was in Springfield, but did not vote; Carlson, who was said to be ill.

Dinner will be served as nearly at noon as the return of the vets from Hinsdale will allow.


