## CALL SOON FOR CONTRIBUTIONS FOR NEAR EAST

Short Explanation of What America Can do for Starving Kids of Armenia.

Some one has raised a question as to the authority and responsibility of the Near East Relief Committee. It is constantly sending out appeals for money and clothing. How do we know that this money reaches the starving

refugees in the form of food?

The Near East Relief was incorporated August 6th, 1919, and approved by the President of the United States and it reports to the Congress of the United States.

In its report for the year ending in December 1920, it publishes many interesting facts, of which the following are examples.

"At least a million people are living in the Near East today who would have perished but for American relief. The committee is now endeavoring in every practicable way to throw upon governments or such other responsible agencies as can be found the support of the adult refugees. The committee will also continue as in the past to develop industrial relief and self support wherever possible."

It is devoting itself largely to caring for the children, saving their lives.

"The war has not ceased in the Near East. Both from a political and a military viewpoint conditions are probably worse today than they were preceding the armistice."

"The committee is endeavoring to find homes or other support for as many as possible of the rescued girls and orphaned children, but it seems inevitable that for a considerable period a large number of these fatherless and motherless waifs of the war must depend upon the Near East Relief for support."

"The children now under our care, wisely guided, will become the leaders in a new era in the Old World."

More than a score of American relief workers have given their lives in the Near East while saving the lives of the war-stricken. Certainly we other Americans, comfortably housed and fed at home, ought to be glad of an opportunity to give aid to this cause.

We are told in recent letters that there are 18,000 new orphans to be provided for and that contributions from America have decreased to a degree that threatens disaster and death to these children during the summer.

A call will shortly be made by several organizations of Downers Grove for contributions of clothing, no doubt for money if we choose to give. This is not a thing done that any local society may receive credit for anything; they may collect, but that our whole community may have a share in the saving of these orphaned children.

## JOHN BOHLANDER, OLD RESIDENT OF HINSDALE, BURIED

Born in Mid-Ocean May 23, 1836—  
Once Proprietor of Store  
in the Grove.

John Bohlander, for many years a merchant of Hinsdale, passed away at his home there, Monday, June 6th, at the age of 85.

Funeral services were held at the Evangelical Church, Hinsdale, Wednesday afternoon the Rev. G. H. Stanger, pastor of the church, officiating. Burial was made in Bronswood cemetery.

Mr. Bohlander was born May 23, 1836 in mid-ocean on an American ship which was carrying his parents, John and Mary Glos Bohlander to this country. When one year old his parents brought him to Illinois from Boston, Mass.

When twenty-one years of age he came to DuPage County, buying a farm in York Township, finally opening a grocery store at York Center. From there he moved to Downers Grove where he conducted a grocery store. In 1871 he moved to Hinsdale and with his brother, Adam, opened a dry goods and grocery store.

Several years later he started a hardware store and to this was added several lines, being always a successful business institution. He left the active management of the store in 1910.

In 1862 Mr. Bohlander was married to Sallie Wolf and to this union were born five children, Mrs. Carrie Dorstewitz, Mrs. Louise Hedge, Mrs. Sarah Dehr, John, Jr., and Henry M., who with his widow, two brothers, one sister, twenty-two grandchildren and six great grandchildren, are left to mourn his loss.
