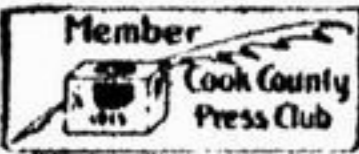

THE SANITARY DISTRICT

An election has been called for Saturday, July 9th, by the Board of Trustees of the Downers Grove Sanitary District. On this day the voters of the district will be asked to grant this Board power to increase the tax rate one-third of one per cent and issue bonds in the sum of \$75,000.

The bonds are for the construction of sewage disposal works and a connecting sewer to connect the present village sewer system with the works. The tax money will be used for the preliminary expenses.

Both of these propositions are necessary and both of them should receive the united support of the voters of the district. The Board is entering into the task ahead of them with a vigor which promises that this community will have the right kind of a sewage disposal plant, something vitally necessary to the health and well being of all. They should have our unqualified approval of what they are trying to do.

THEY FORGET 4 CENT SUGAR IN 75 CENT CANDY

We hear a voice crying in the wilderness of deflation. It is the wail of the great national candy manufacturers, lamenting because they have to make their product, which contains, as one of its ingredients, sugar that cost them 25 to 30 cents a pound not many moons ago. They weep as they tell us of the "great business tragedy" that compels them to "put 30 cent sugar into 20 cent candy."

We sympathize with them. But we cannot help but give our first sympathy to our neighbors, the farmer who suffered more severely than they, and our town business men who had to sell goods for 20 cents that they paid 30 cents for.

Our neighbors never were great profit makers. Our farmer and town merchants always had to be happy with a reasonable turnover of the money they had invested in their business. They never made dividends that permitted them to build palaces and go rolling over Europe in Rolls-Royces and Packards. But in the case of the great national candy manufacturers we might well ask them at this sad stage of affairs when they are putting 30 cent sugar into 20 cent candy, if they can remember back when they put 4 cent sugar into 75 cent candy. Surely, reference to their bank books will recall those joyous days.

Deflation is here. The farmer, merchant and the town merchant have "ridden their goat" and are now hard at work, making the best of the situation, well knowing that hard times are only the prelude to good times, and well knowing, too, that good times are only the prelude to hard times. They are not weeping and wailing and "big business" might well take a lesson from them.
