ATTORNEY BUNGE GAVE ADVICE TO WHEATON COUNCIL

Called by Fathers of Neighboring City to Unscramble Sewer Fight With State.

Attorney G. H. Bunge, of the Village, was called to Wheaton last week Saturday evening by the City Council to help in the unscrambling of the fight they are having with the State over their sewage question.

They were ordered several years ago by the State Department of Health to treat the sewage in such a way that it would not pollute the stream into which it empties. After months of work the Council passed an ordinance and specifications for a new disposal plant and connecting sewer, the work to be done immediately.

A petition was presented the Board asking for a referendum on the question; Wheaton working under the Commission Form of Government; and at the election the proposition was knocked out. The State came back with a real boomerang. They asked the Court for an injunction restraining the city from using its sewers. If this was granted it would put the people in one of the worst predicaments possible; a complete sewer system and not able to use it.

Mr. Bunge has made quite a reputation for himself in the handling of the legal side of municipal affairs and with this in mind the Wheaton Council called him to a special meeting.

The advice given by Mr. Bunge was that they should repeal the ordinance which the people turned down; pass another, the same one if they wished, and then ignore all petitions asking for referendums. He claims that in a case of this kind the referendum part of the Commission Law is not operative. In a similar case at Princeton, where Mr. Bunge was the attorney of the Council, he won the case before the trial judge and defeated some of the best railroad attorneys in the state.

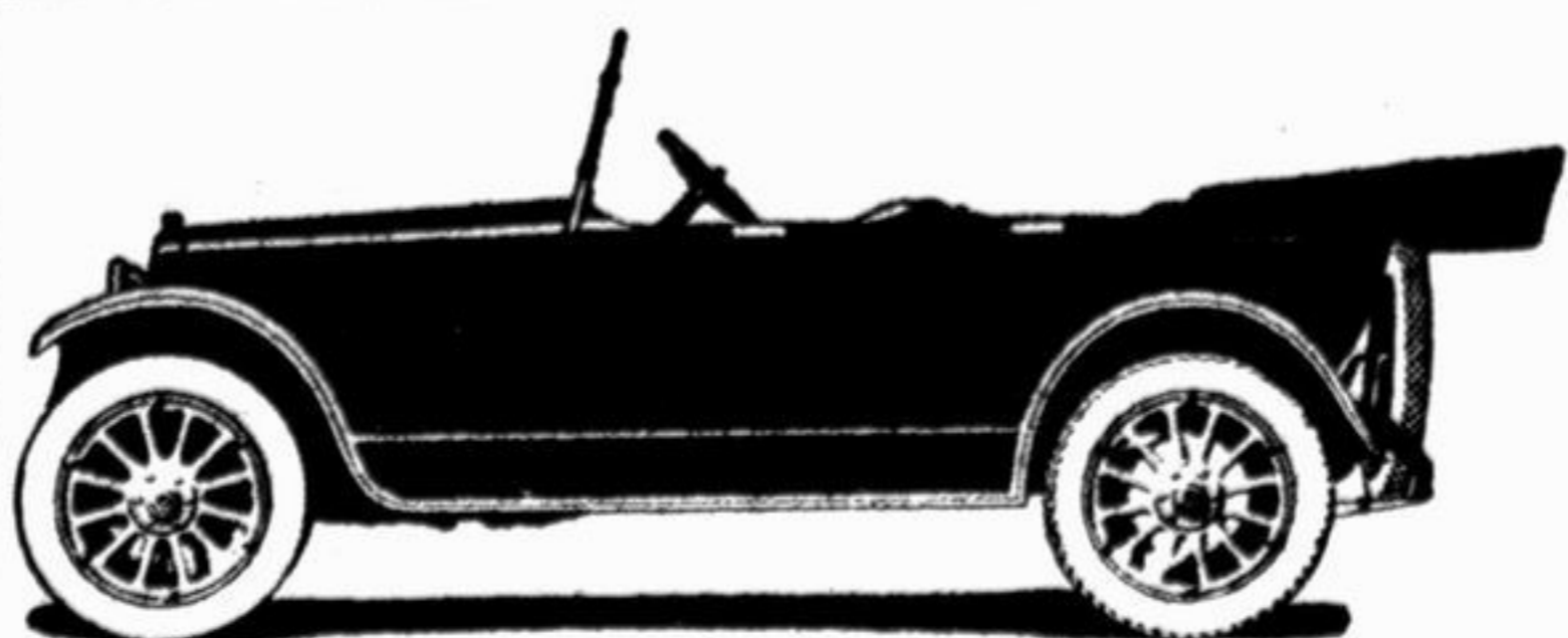
