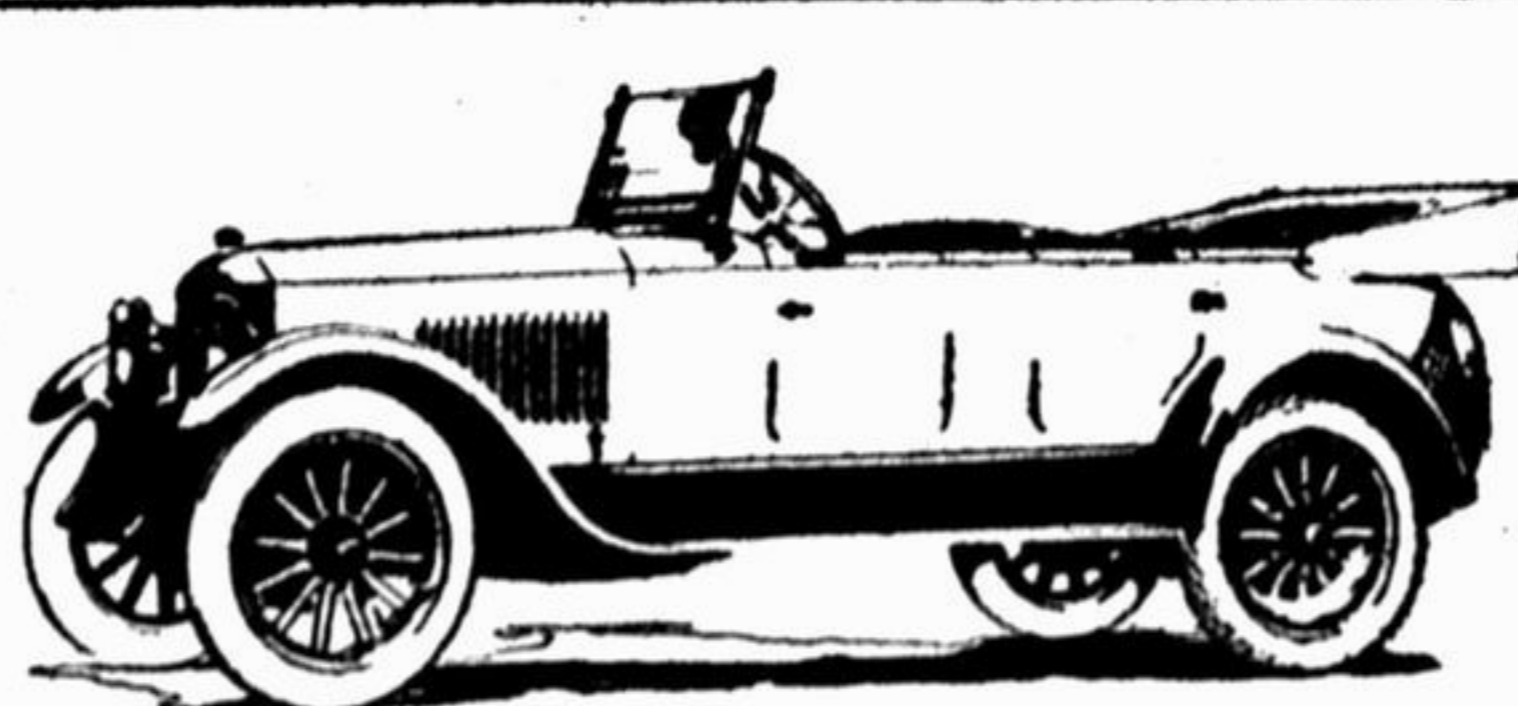
Paul Prickett, Asst. Scout Master, flivvered to the camp for the Fourth. He reports good fishing and excellent swimming.

W. H. Richie Writes of Auto Trip From Wheaton to State of New Jersey.

Moorestown, New Jersey, July 3. Dear Mr. Staats:

Found this old envelope so that I would use it and drop you a line.

I'm working as a Field Secretary for the Pocket Testament League, holding noon meetings in the Industrial plants of Philadelphia and Camden. Thousands of Pocket Testaments have been given free to men and women (Protestant, Catholic, Jewish) and anyone who will agree to read them each day. A very fruitful effort among folks who don't often get much religious influence and I like it

very much. We came East by auto and "Henry" did nobly, climbing all the mountains of New York and Pennsylvania, except two, which we had to cross. Had a team help us up the last half of one hill when transmission bands wore out and an auto another time had to tow us up. We surely saw some great country, across Michigan at Detroit, down Lake Erie by boat; at Niagara and Watkins Glen; Cornell University; then in a lumber camp in northern Pennsylvania; over the Poconos and on down to our home in New Jersey—just 1,003 miles from Wheaton.
