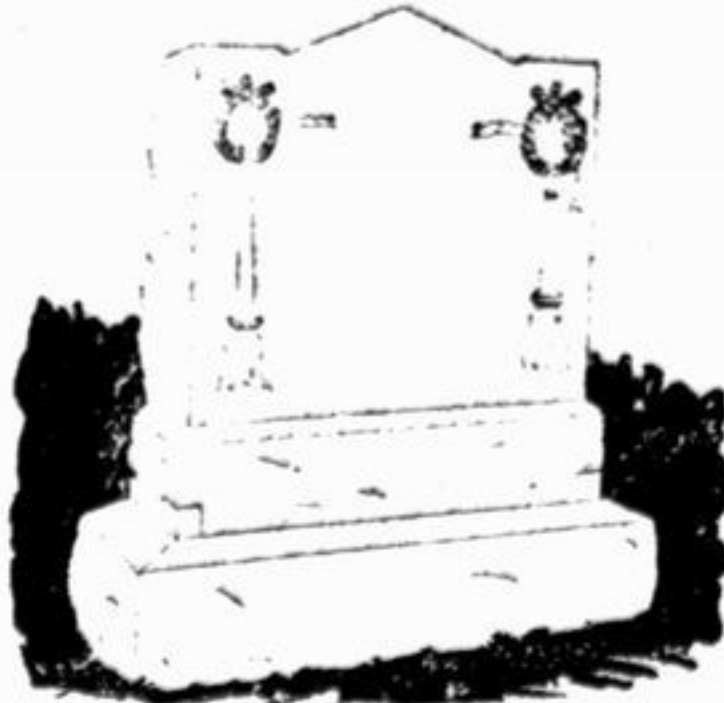

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BOND ISSUE AND INCREASE IN TAX RATE BOTH CARRY

Voters Overwhelmingly Favor Backing up Sanitary District Trustees' Program.

Both issues in regard to the Downers Grove Sanitary District were almost unanimously carried by the voters of the district at the special election held last Saturday.

The proposition to issue \$75,000 worth of bonds to carry out the program for which the district was organized received only three contrary votes. The totals were 131 for the bond issue and three against.

Seven people voted against the increase in the district tax rate of one-third of one per cent, the totals being—Yes, 127; No, 7.

With the light vote, it seemed to those interested that it would be an easy matter to defeat either or both of the propositions. The final result was a surprise, the small number of people opposing the bond issue and the tax increase being almost negligible.

It is expected that the preliminary work on the issuing of the bonds will be done at once so that some progress can be made on the new disposal plant and outlet sewer at once. No returns will be received from the taxes until next spring.

HERMAN H. HEINTZ

Herman H. Heintz, 207 Park ave., was born in Pekin, Illinois, December 12th, 1872 and departed the scenes of this earthly life on the morning of July 9th, 1921, at the age of 48 years, 6 months and 27 days. The cause of his decease was cancerous enlargement of the liver which caused him great suffering during the last few days of his illness. He was confined to his bed for nearly five weeks before death came.

Mr. Heintz was united in marriage with Miss Emily Mohr of Chicago, Ill., June 12th, 1900. This union was blessed with three children, all of whom survive their father.

After residing for a number of years in Chicago where the family attended Salem Evangelical Church, they came to Downers Grove in the month of July 1916.

Mr. Heintz died expressing his faith in the grace of God and in firm hope of salvation and of meeting with loved ones in Heaven.

His loving wife preceded him to her reward on March 4th, 1918. He is survived by his mother, two brothers, his three children, Lillian, Clarence and Grace, and many other relatives.

Funeral services were conducted at the house Tuesday afternoon by the Rev. J. Alfred Nansen, pastor of 1st Evangelical Church. Interment was made in Forest Home cemetery.

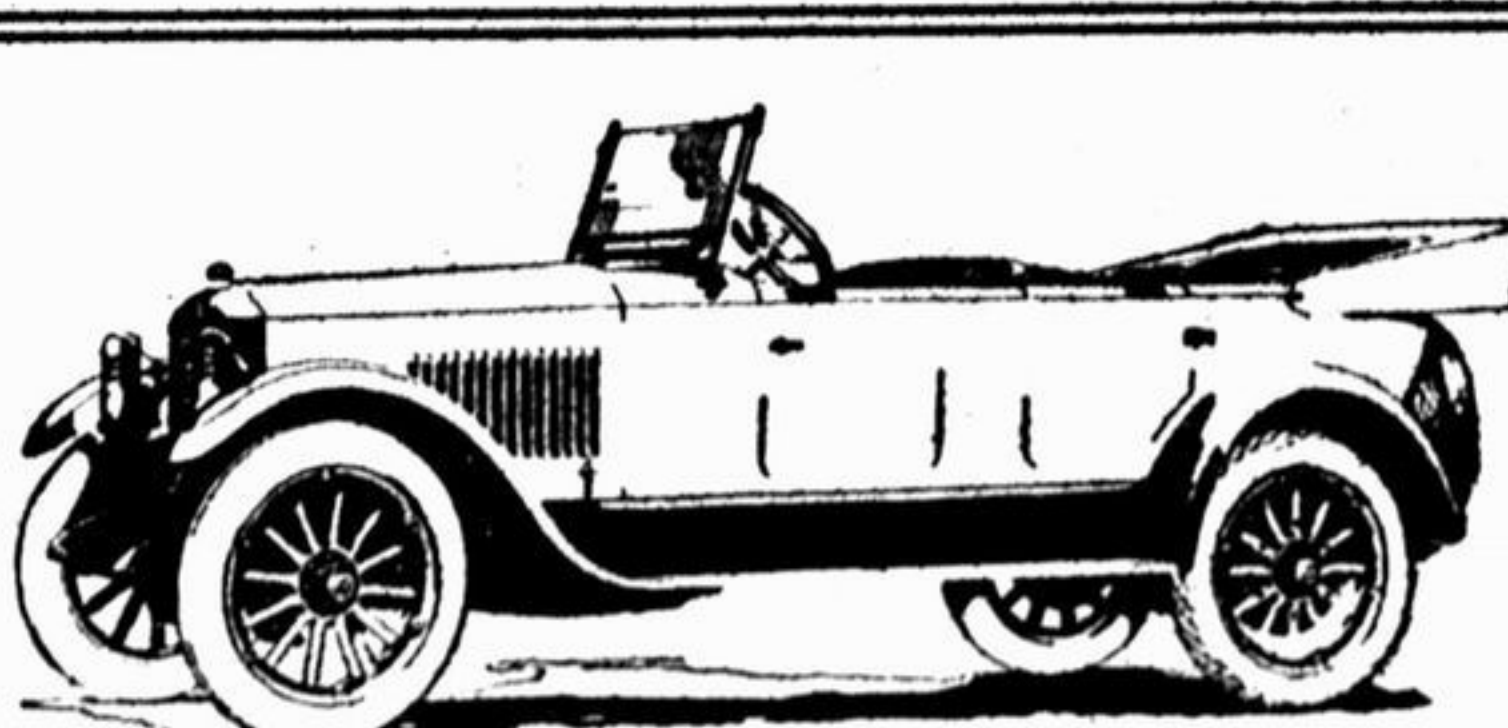
