

If anyone doubts the popularity of the Union Open Air Church Services on the lawn of the Methodist Church Sunday evenings, let him attend the next one.

For the last few years the open air services have been drawing cards on Sunday evenings. Until this year they were held on Curtiss street, between the Library and the Congregational Church and as "The Church of the Closed Street" their fame spread to the most remote corners of the country. Downers Grove is credited with starting the idea which was adopted by many communities.

Co-operating in church work has been advocated by laymen and ministers for many years. Most of the results accomplished, however, have I been of the mere talking variety. Here in our little village, the results obtained from these union open air services, where members of the different congregations and the heads of the churches, really get together and do things, shows that co-operation is a fine thing.
