
Salt and Ice.

Mixing pounded ice and salt has the effect of producing what is called a freezing mixture. The mixture has a lendency to become brine, the ice melting and the salt dissolving in the water formed. To melt, however, it must absorb heat and this is taken from bondes with which it is in contact, such as water, cream, etc. In this way bee cream can be made.

LEN SMALL, FRED STERLING, TWENTY-TWO ET AL.

The State of Illinois is very much wrought up over the question of whether or not Governor Len Small and Lieutenant Governor Fred Sterling are guilty of keeping money which rightfully belonged to the people of the State. They should be and the rest of the country is watching the outcome of the big political fight which was responsible for the indictment of these and other men by a Sangamon County Grand Jury.

What we, and we believe ninetynine per cent of the other people of the State would like to see, is a quick trial and a show down, one way or the other. We are all a little puzzled over Governor Small's attitude in the matter. We hesitate between the feeling that he is playing for time, trying to "stall" as it were, because he is guilty, and that he is really sincere in following the advice of his lawyers when they talk very knowingly about the law regarding the arrest of a Governor on a criminal charge.

We look at it in a way we have heard expressed by many out "on the street." If Mr. Small is guilty of the charge which has been placed against him he should be brought to justice and made to either serve his sentence or make reparation of some kind the same as an ordinary man would have to do. If he isn't guilty the facts should be made known,

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
