W. H. Rogers and Nettie F. Morgan and families attended a family reunion picnic at Warrenville Sunday, July 31st.

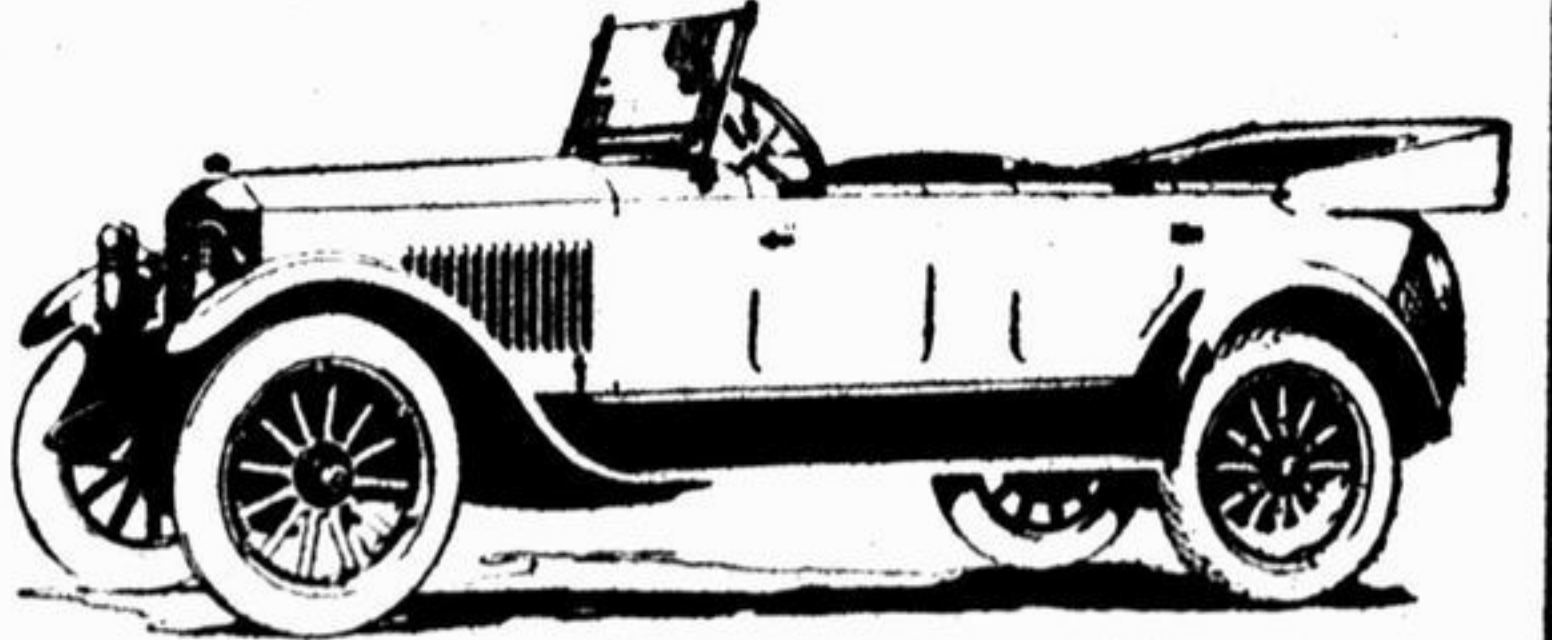
There were 105 present and that is not half of the relatives who live within a radius of 50 miles. Next year it is hoped that they will all be present.
