MOTHERS' PENSION LAW ENFORCED IN DU PAGE COUNTY

Henry Neil, of Hinsdale, "Father" of Law, Makes Investigation and Gives Report

My conference at Wheaton last Wednesday afternoon with DuPage County Judge S. L. Rathje and with County Clerk A. A. Kuhn made plain the fact that DuPage County is fortunate in that it has very few mothers with dependent children and all of these few who are entitled to mothers' pensions are now getting them.

The amendment to the Mothers' Pension law that went into effect on July 1st allows a pensioned mother to own \$1000 equity in her own house. The limitation of \$60 per family is removed. The law now allows the mother \$5 a month in addition to \$10 a month for each and every child under 14 years of age.

I found Judge Rathje very sympathetic with this law. County Clerk Kuhn told me that every mother in DuPage County who is entitled to a pension is getting it each month. This is more than can be said for Cook County where there are over 300 mothers and 1000 children on the waiting list.

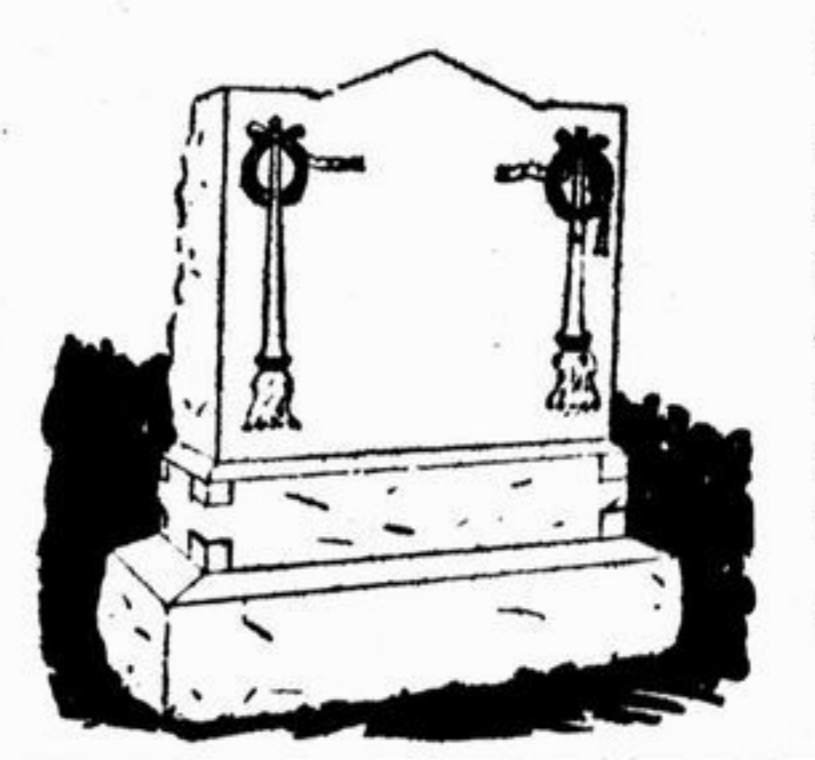
