MANY MOTORISTS GET GUIDES THRU "THE REPORTER"

First Supply Was Exhausted in Two Days—Other Guides Have Been Sent For.

Through the thoughtfulness of The Reporter 100 Downers Grove motorists now have auto guides showing various proved routes in all directions from Chicago and a motor road map of Illinois, Western Indiana, Eastern Iowa and Southern Wisconsin.

These guides are issued by the Chicago Daily News and which The Reporter deemed good enough to secure a supply for its readers. They were given away at J. L. Swearingen's News Agency, this being the most central point, free of charge.

Our first supply was 100 copies, as we thought this would be sufficient to supply everyone who would care for one. The 100 copies were gone in two days and so great was the demand for more, that more have been sent for. The new supply will be here in time for distribution Saturday and if you haven't received your guide, stop at Swearingen's and get one.

The guides are free and The Reporter takes pleasure in getting them for local motorists.

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MARKETING PLAN FOR LIVE STOCK IS NATIONAL ONE

Producers Asked to Send Representatives to Chicago in September.

Live stock producers of Illinois and every other state in the Union, will be asked to send representatives to Chicago in September to help work out the details of the new national live stock marketing plan of the Committee of Fifteen, according to a report received today by the DuPage County Farm Bureau from the Illinois Agricultural Association.

The Committee of Fifteen is a body of fifteen agricultural experts selected by the American Farm Bureau Federation who began work last February to study the live stock marketing situation. After seven months of investigation, aided by the Government, they have presented a new cooperative live stock marketing plan which will put into effect as soon as it is approved by producers. The plan is briefly as follows:

1. A national association of cooperative live stock producers with headquarters in Chicago. Belonging to this national association; terminal live stock commission associations at the various live stock markets of the country. Belonging to these terminal

associations; local cooperative live stock shipping associations.

2. The national board is to be governed by a board of not less than seven, nor more than fifteen directors, chosen by producers. The terminal live stock commission associations are to provide for producer-owned and controlled cooperative live stock commission firms at the markets where they are needed. Subsidy to each of these firms will be a stocker and feeder company, from which the patronage dividends will be prorated back to the consignor-member. The usual commission charge will be levied by the commission firms but all earnings will be prorated back among the producers.

3. No contract to be signed by producers is to be called in Chicago on September 2, with the object in view of standardizing local cooperative shipping associations the country over into an ideal form of organization. To this conference are invited not more than three producers representing each State, these producers to submit advice and suggestions to the Committee of Fifteen.

4. Producers of the United States are to be asked to attend a ratification conference at a date to be set between October 15 and November 1, to consider the plan of the Committee of Fifteen and to offer suggestions. H. W. Mumford, director of the

live stock marketing department of the Illinois Agricultural Association, and W. J. Carmichael, are the two Illinois members of the Committee of Fifteen.

A producer-owned and controlled

cooperative live stock commission firm will be established at once at the East St. Louis Stock Yards. Mr. Mumford is on the committee to help select the board of directors for it and set up the firm in operation.
