

LEGION LOST FAST GAME LAST SUNDY TO CHI. ATHLETICS

Hinsdale and Locals to Tie Up in Two Games Over the Next Holiday.

The Legion nine lost a fast and snappy game Sunday to the Chicago Athletics at Memorial Park. It was one of the fastest and most hotly contested tilts seen on the local diamond this year.

Downers had the keenest bunch of ball players on the field they have had this year and although losing the game they looked like world beaters.

The Legionnaires climbed on to a three run lead in the first frame and looked like winners until the sad 8th round. Four singles, a pair of errors and passed balls allowed three runners to register in the eighth.

Pitcher Foote of the Athletics twirled in real form. At no time after the first was he in danger and he bowed each assailant without much trouble. A total of twelve strike outs is recorded.

The Athletics put across a marker in the fourth when Mesch singled and took second on Dickson's error. Thurston knocked one for a sack, putting Mesch across. Ehninger's quick peg to Binder on a fly for a double stopped further damage. Again in the fifth a double, a single and an error put one across. The locals still had a lead of a tally but the eighth ruined all hopes.

Sunday the Marshalls of Chicago will be the opponents at Memorial Park. This outfit will be remembered as a real classy bunch as they did battle here a short time ago, when they trimmed the locals 12 to 8. The locals did not have the line up they have now and a fast game can be looked for.

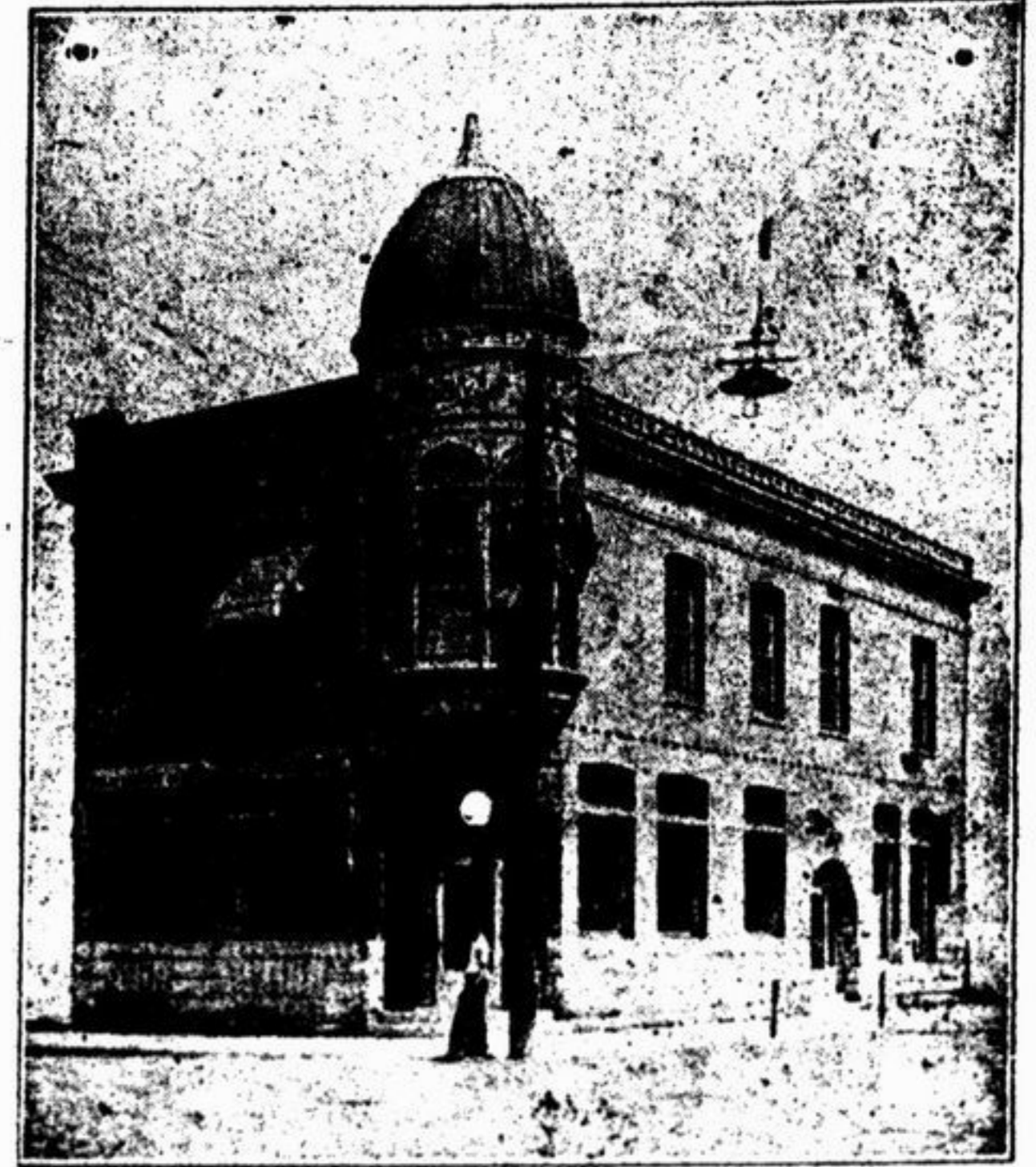
Mixed English.
