JUST ABOUT SOME REAL FISHING

All You Local Anglers Who've Been Missing Them This Year —Read This.

Editor Reporter. Fishing? Are they biting? Huh; ask me again. Arrived at old Pelican Lake, Wis., Sunday a. m., August 21st, 4:40, temperature 40, and old timer, Ed Keeler, informed us (that's Geo. Mac Dougal, dad and myself) that so far this season it was not very good on account of the dry weather. Well I guess we must have been three sevens in a row, for they commenced to bite Monday morning bright and early, and we had all we could do to keep the pike and bass from jumping into the boat, and I am not stringing you either. Just ask Heim from Naperville.

The usual depth of 8 feet was too shallow and we had to have anchor chains about 30 to 35 feet in length and fished at 29 to 34 feet for wall-eyed pike, using minnows.

Bass were running in about 6 to 8 feet on the reefs and worms proved to be the best lure although an Al Foss pork rind bait did quite a little side work.

Muskies are not striking at a trolled bait, but will strike at a cast, and the bassoreno seems to be the favorite.

Resthaven Resort sent out over 35 boxes and baskets of fish last week, among them three muskies, 19, 22 and 32 pounds, the latter caught by Mr. Hunneman of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Made a couple of shipments ourselves and although some one inspected one of the boxes very thoroughly, the fish were all there and in good
