

### WESTMONT HOLDS A MASS MEETING ON INCORPORATION

#### Town Divided on Project of Peticioning Court and Starting Village.

Westmonters crowded the lunch room and store just south of the tracks there on Tuesday evening at a meeting called for the purpose of gauging the feeling and starting a movement for the incorporation of that thriving young place into a village.

The meeting was presided over by Vincent Pastor, proprietor of the Garibaldi Inn on the Naperville road. Mr. Pastor spoke briefly on the reasons for the calling of the mass meeting and introduced John D. Peterson, an attorney of Evanston. Mr. Peterson told of the legal steps necessary for incorporation purposes and some of the advantages of Westmont taking this step.

Mr. McIntosh, head of the firm which subdivided the property, was also present. He advised the incorporation of the place, but said that his firm was with the majority and anything a majority of the citizens of Westmont wanted, the firm would be with them.

A general discussion followed in which several of those who live in the new place made violent objections to the incorporation process taking place. Those who stand in the way of progress can be found in almost every municipality and Westmont is no exception. However, a great majority of the residents are desirous of having things up to date and to do so realize that incorporation is the only way.

A new organization, the Westmont Improvement Association, had charge of the meeting. It developed that an old one, known as the Westmont Civic Club, were somewhat jealous of the new and a vast amount of heckling took place.

After the speakers had left, a neutral chairman was appointed and narrowly escaping several fist fights, the difficulties were ironed out, the two bodies getting together under the name of The Westmont Improvement and Civic Association. Officers were elected and it is thought that immediate action will be had on the matter of incorporation.

Those most interested in the de-

velopment of the town are heartily in favor of going right ahead. There is however, a hitch as to the boundary lines of the embryo village. Some insist that the Naperville road be the north boundary, others that it be farther north and so on. It will take several weeks before anything definite is done and we hope that the progressive element in the town can control things so that Westmont will be able to have running water, sidewalks, paved streets, sewers and other advantages if she wants them.

#### Filipino Team and Naperville Both Triumph Over Bradley and Baron, Pitchers.

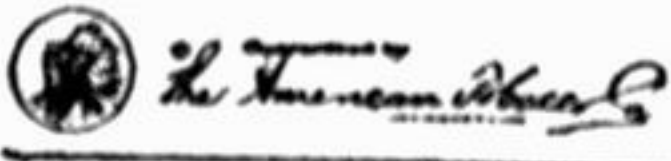

FLORAL TREASURE ..... 75c  
Very large, showy, rose type. Pale lilac-rose. Fragrant. Strong, tall, upright grower, free bloomer. Mid-season.

JEANNE D'ARC ..... 50c  
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COURONNE D'OR ..... 75c  
Large, flat, semi-rose type. Pure white, with a ring of yellow stamens around a tuft of center petals, tipped carmine. Medium tall, splendid grower, free bloomer. Late. One of the best white varieties.

MADAME CROUSSE ..... 75c  
Medium size, globular, crown. Pure white, center flecked crimson. Strong medium height; free bloomer. Mid-season. One of the best white varieties.

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
