The greatest interest centered in the raffle for the \$300 worth of coal. Only about 450 tickets had been sold as the firemen were discouraged in the sale by many they approached.

The first three were blanks (that is the name of the purchaser was not known) the fourth was Dan Miley's; fifth, a winner, Harry Karstens, who lives south of town; sixth, John Graves, seventh a winner, Mrs. F. B. Roos, 512 Marenge ave., Forest Park; eighth was blank; ninth, Earl Tholin; ten, blank and eleven, a winner, L. Richardson, a driver for the Lord Lumber Co.
