The next three frames were targe. In the sixth the locals made Hinsdale look bad and especially Pitcher Geisler, as they bunted him out of the league. Geisler's control was lax as he passed Carpenter and Shanabrook to open the sixth. Ehninger's roller couldn't be handled and the sacks were polluted with no one down and Geisler looked foolish as Bob scored and Brick rested on the initial sack. Geisler picked off Jim Karesh forcing in Shanny. Butch laid down a bunt and again Geisler couldn't handle it, letting Ehninger trip across. Mochel and Curtiss popped out leaving the locals with a two run lead. Again in the seventh the locals looked likable to score when Billy got on with a single, went to second on Herb's sacrifice and took third on a passed ball but couldn't count when Busch made a running catch of Binder's long fly. In the ninth Curtiss sent one to deep center for a home run making the final count seven to four.

Chase laid down a mean roller between Ted and Brick, which Ted had a hard time getting to and threw wild from a poor position. Bob got the count to three and one and stepped into one which rolled to Theidel and was an easy out ending a rally that almost ruined hopes of victory for the Hinsdaleans.

Hinsdale believes they are due for another victory and whether or not they can put it across will be settled on September 25th, at Memorial Park.
