ENROLLMENT OF LOCAL SCHOOLS LARGEST EVER

More Than Nine Hundred Students in Grade and High Schools - Rooms Crowded.

Downers Grove schools are crowded to capacity. This can be easily seen when the fact is known that more than nine hundred are enrolled in the public and parochial schools of the village.

This sets a record for enrollment and shows that the community has made a growth during the past year hard to estimate.

The greatest percentage of gain is in the high school. Here 216, 130 boys and 86 girls, were enrolled the first and second days. The number of seats in assembly hall is just 160 and that is about the capacity of the school.

In the public grade schools 542 children are enrolled. The total at the St. Joseph Parochial school is 122 and at St. Marys Parochial school in East Grove it is 90, making a grand total of grade school children of 854 and a grand total of all school students, high and grade, of 970. Almost one thousand children attending the schools of the village.
