

LORD LUMBER CO. STARTS WORK ON WESTMONT BRANCH

Office and Scales Will be Erected Immediately—Have Land for a Lumber Yard.

Excavation was started Tuesday afternoon on Cass avenue, south of the "Q" in Westmont for the erection of an office and scales for the branch office of the Lord Lumber Co. there. The company has acquired title to a considerable stretch of land lying east of this street and south of the Burlington with side track facilities. They will have coal on the ground for delivery to Westmonters in the immediate future and the probabilities are a small stock of lumber which will be added to as the business justifies it.

Sufficient ground has been acquired to expand and this branch will give the company still another office along the "Q" as they now operate at La Grange, Hinsdale and Downers Grove and with their mill at LaGrange they are prepared to handle almost any order anywhere in this vicinity.

That Westmont will soon have a postoffice is the belief of those who make their thriving village their home. Mrs. Edgar Mathews has made application for the position of postmistress and if her application is favorably acted upon, mail will be handled from the store and lunch room run by her husband, just south of the tracks and west of Cass ave.

The new Burlington depot at Westmont is nearing completion. It will be a neat structure and will add greatly to the appearance as one steps from the train.

The Westmont school, held in the former McIntosh office at the corner of the Naperville Road and Cass avenue, is somewhat crowded, to say the least. Miss Alice Mitchell, of LaGrange, is the teacher and she has thirty pupils in this little building and teaches all grades. There are three little rooms and conditions are far from being what they should be.

The work of excavating of the water mains is almost completed. Pipe is on the ground and those who bought water with their lots will soon be using it.

Indications are that Westmont will soon be burning electricity from the Downers Grove plant. A committee of citizens visited the Downers Council meeting on Monday night with a petition and received the virtual promise that their request would be complied with.

Removing Mildew.

Chloride of lime, used intelligently, will remove mildew. Do not use too much. A teaspoonful to a small tub or pail full of water is plenty. Be sure lime is thoroughly dissolved, or better still, tie it up in a stout piece of cloth and run water onto it, pressing the cloth with a stick; then allow it to float in tub. Immerse article to be cleansed and allow to stand several hours. Remove and rinse thoroughly in several waters. Repeat if necessary, but do not increase quantity of lime, as it will eat the material.

ILLINOIS MAN ON FRUIT MARKETING COMMITTEE OF 21

American Farm Bureau Federation Now Starts Investigation on Conditions.

C. E. Durst, director of the fruit and vegetable marketing department of the Illinois Agricultural Association, is the only Illinois man who was named on the committee of 21 fruit marketing experts appointed by the American Farm Bureau Federation to investigate the national situation and propose a plan or plans of marketing. The appointment of this committee is the outgrowth of a huge conference of fruit marketers held in Chicago, April 5th.

Mr. Durst has been a prominent figure in the organization of cooperative fruit and vegetable marketing companies in Southern Illinois this spring and summer.

Few people realize that Illinois is one of the greatest states in the production of fruit. Southern Illinois leads the country in the production of early apples and Marion County is the greatest in the country in the raising of pears.

National committees are now at work on national marketing plans for the dairy and live stock industries as well as fruit. The national grain marketing plan is already in operation.

It was finally decided to call another meeting for next Monday evening to be held at Library Hall and have a representative present from every church and society in the village to organize a relief society.

At present there are no known cases of want among the ex-service men or their families of the village. There is no knowing, however, when such a case may present itself which will be too much for the Legion or the Auxiliary to handle. In a case of this kind it would be great if there was an association to which they could turn.
