AUTO BANDIT GANG WORKED ON BUTTERFIELD SUNDAY

Five in Nash Hold Up, Miss Hazel Wilson and Herbert Weinbauer near Roosevelt Road.

Last Sunday night five men about 25 to 30 years of age in a Nash touring car ran about DuPage County holding folks up at the point of revolvers, taking their money and scaring the ladies badly. They made two hold-ups before stopping Miss Hazel Wilson and her escort on their way to Gardale-in-the-Woods, where Miss Wilson is visiting during her teaching at the Utopia School in School District No. 52. The robbers ran their car up aside the Wilson car at the corner of the Butterfield and Canfield roads, edging her car off the road and causing it to stop. They yelled "hands up" at Miss Wilson and her escort, Mr. Herbert Weinbauer, who promptly obeyed. The robbers ordered them out of their car and

took about \$21.00 from them. They then cut all the light wires to their victims' car and threw Miss Wilson into their car to carry off, but the driver of the robber car, who seemed to be the only sober one of the five robbers, objected, and commanded the other four to let the teacher out, which they did.

The robber car then sped away west on the Butterfield road and Mr. Weinbauer at once reported the robbery to Mr. Fred Voss near by, the deputy sheriff for York Township, who at once got busy with other peace officers about the county, they spending the rest of the night till daylight searching all automobile parties they came across without success. The peace officers of our county should be highly commended for the prompt action taken to hunt the robbers and all law abiding citizens of the county should help them in every way possible to make DuPage County a safe place to live in.

as they were not Du Page County folks no details are available.
