WINTER CAMPAIGN STARTED BY LEGION POSTS OF DU PAGE

Ex-Service Men Make Plans for Relief of Former Soldiers During Coming Winter.

The DuPage County organization of the American Legion comprising all posts in this county open their season's activities with plans for a drive for a Relief Fund to be used in meeting the wide spread suffering and needs of ex-service men due to unemployment and disability.

In a nut shell, here is the first phase of the Relief Plan.

A general campaign is now underway to reach every disabled man whose claim has not been taken care of. This campaign is being carried on jointly by the New Soldier Bureau created by the enactment of the Sweet Bill, The Red Cross and the Legion.

To provide a means of relief to all ex-service men out of funds and out of jobs the old Grand Pacific Hotel in Chicago has been leased by the Legion and will be opened as a hotel for veterans only. Men will be registered in order to eliminate imposters and to properly classify them according to their different vocations and trades. They will be provided with a bed, clean night gown, towel and bath for ten cents. Breakfast will be furnished for 10 cents and supper for 20 cents, making a total expense per day for each man of 40 cents.

Those who are able to pay will be expected to do so and those who have no money will be given credit with the understanding that it is a debt of honor that they will be trusted to pay when they are financially able.

The equipping of this building to provide for 1200 men, the maintenance, coal, light and food will require no small amount of money.

A complete Service and Employment Bureau will be established in the hotel. Thus a Central Employment Bureau will be provided with which all the employment departments of the factories and business houses can cooperate.


