NOTES OF DOWNERS GROVE SCHOOLS

To unify the work of the High Y organizations of DuPage County in the seven high schools in which such organizations have been perfected, Mr. Caster, County Y. M. C. A. worker, accompanied by Mr. Walker, State Y. M. C. A. Secretary, visited our high school last Thursday. The plan involves the choosing of two boys from each school who will form a council whose work will be with the aid of the county secretary, to outline a program for High Y club work.

This work is nation-wide in its scope. There are in the United States at present 1435 High Y clubs and 41,280 high school students enrolled; in Illinois last year 35 clubs were active, while this year 104 clubs with an enrollment of 2,560 indicates the growth of this movement.

A list of their problems, as indicated by the program of a Wisconsin organization, involves character building problems readily solved by high school boys anywhere. Here are 25 things boys think about:

Dice shaking, betting and gambling, cigarettes, cussing, smut, cribbing, cliques, social life, lack of interest in study, lack of school spirit, wasting money, loafing, lying, pool hall, stealing, drinking, improper dancing, auto joyriding, attitude toward girls, immorality, shows lack of interest in religious life and non-sportsmanlike conduct.

The selection of a leader for these boys in our city, is one of their first steps. A cordial cooperation between the club and the school is secured by their inviting a school representative to meet with them. Does this look like a good club for your boy?

The first meeting of this school year was held at the High School last Thursday evening. Sec. Caster was present and assisted in the organization of the club for this year's work.

School spirit is the vital thing in school life. It calls out the best effort in all lines, converts all tasks

into pleasures, develops comradeship, strengthens friendships and directs purpose. Without it no school will grow numerically nor develop potentially. What we do is important, but how we do it is more important.

Downers Grove High School has school spirit. Just now we are playing football. Not only is the team playing, the second string who are developing ability and gaining knowledge of the game for use in next years contests, but the whole school is playing.

This support by the whole school and the community is the thing that puts heart into the team when they have the short end of the score, and makes the game young until the last minute of play.

The cheers and songs on the field and in the assembly room are absolutely indispensable. Better work in field sport is always done under the inspiration of the cheers of classmates and spectators than is ever done under the eye of the coach alone and better work in the school room is a proven result.

If every grade pupil in our city could hear the songs and school yells given in our high school assembly on last Friday, it would have been a fine thing. It does not annoy us a bit. It just fixes the determination in us all to be a high school pupil some day and feel the spirit which carries all work along by the momentum acquired in the game.
