COUNTY OFFICERS HELP RAISE FLAG POLE FOR SCHOOL

Lewis B. Morgan, Co. School Supt., Was in Charge of Appropriate Ceremonies.

The steel flag pole was raised last Saturday at the Utopia School House, Butterfield and Westmore Roads, after splendid exercises under the direction of Mr. Lewis B. Morgan, Co. Supt. of Schools, who officiated as chairman. A goodly attendance was enthusiastic in applauding the speakers, and when at the close of the affair Miss Hazel Wilson, the teacher, unfurled the flag loaned from Gard-

ner for the occasion the hand clapping was splendid.

Major Charles H. Gard spoke offering the pole to the school board of the district as a teaching to the children in patriotism and called attention to the fact that the flag was the outward sign of the liberty we all enjoy in this country, to do anything we each feel disposed of within the law.

Mr. A. A. Kuhn, County Clerk, gave an oration on the flag, reciting its history from the time Betsy Ross made the first flag up to the present, telling us of all the various sizes and kinds of the stars and stripes. Mr. Kuhn claimed to have been reared as a farmer, but has since departed from the path of rectitude and entered politics.

Mr. George Fix, President of the Board of County Supervisors, made a speech on education and said he hoped to help the teachers and the schools of DuPage County all possible.

Mrs. Charles H. Gard was called to the concrete base of the pole and asked to make her first public speech, although she has orated many times in private. Having been a teacher when she was a charming young lady herself, she told how things used to be, but said that school teaching is not what it used to be forty years ago.

Miss Hazel Wilson, the pretty little teacher at the school, was called to the block and asked for a talk, which was charmingly given and well received by all present. Mr. Lewis B. Morgan, County Superintendent, spoke on the idea of the flag pole so kindly donated by Mr. Gard and so strongly erected in concrete base by the directors. He then placed in the base of the shaft in the concrete a copy of the Chicago Tribune, October 1, a copy of the Chicago Daily News, Sept. 30th; a copy of a county paper and a copy of the school district map of DuPage county. On the top of the papers he sank in a sealed wrapped air tight bottle containing pictures of the board of school directors, the donor of the flag pole and two pictures of the school house; two sheets containing signatures of every one attending clear down to the smallest child present; and a list of the workers who performed the work on the pole, its base and its erection.

The pole was then set up by main strength, all helping in some way. Mr. Fix said he had never seen the County Clerk work so much or so hard in his life, and Mr. Kuhn said he never before new how strong Mr. Morgan could be in lifting.

Then Miss Wilson unfurled old glory to the breeze, and the old corner of the cross roads looked like it had taken on new life.

Miss Wilson announced that the school having been favored with such a fine pole, she would take it on herself to buy a fine flag and would announce some sort of a party before the end of October that all could attend and she would use all the admits to buy the flag. Mr. Fix at once handed her a dollar and Mr. Kuhn engaged front seats at her show to be.
