INFORMAL RECEPTION TO CAPTAIN HOBSON AT SEVEN

Ministers, Village Officials, Wives, Invited to Church Before Evening Meeting.

Captain Hobson will arrive in Downers Grove from Aurora next Sunday evening on the 5:42 train. He will be met by a delegation of the local ministers.

At seven o'clock there will be an informal reception given to Captain Hobson at First Evangelical Church. All the ministers of Downers Grove and their wives, the Mayor of the village and the Village Councilmen and their wives, editors of local papers and the Superintendent of Downers Grove schools and an additional group composed of two prominent laymen of each church and their wives (to be appointed by the pastors) are requested to be present at this informal reception. Seats will be reserved on the platform for this entire group for the mass meeting at 7:30.

Tunnel That Helped to Dig Itself.

In the Simpson tunnel under the Alps, which is by far the greatest tunnel in the world, the quantity of water flowing out of the southern end, from the many veins encountered in the heart of the mountain, amounted to 15,000 gallons a minute, and furnished sufficient power to compress the air by which the drills were worked, and to refrigerate the tunnel. The necessity for refrigeration may be judged from the fact that the heat in the deeper parts of the tunnel rose as high as 150 degrees Fahrenheit when not artificially reduced.

Women Occupied Whole Train.

The first train wholly occupied by women in the history of railroad travel was that chartered by a Massachusetts delegation to attend the women's congress held in Chicago at the time of the World's fair in that city.

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L. L. EMERSON TO AID IN RECOVERING STOLEN CARS

To Issue Weekly Bulletin Containing Complete Description of "Lost" Automobiles.

To aid police authorities in finding stolen automobiles, Secretary of State Louis L. Emerson has established a reporting bureau, and will issue a bulletin once each week which will be sent to every police department and sheriff in the State. This service is in compliance with the provisions of a bill adopted by the last General Assembly.

The bulletin gives the name of the car, the model, the serial number, engine number, State license number, and style of the body in each case.

It also describes peculiarities of the car, such as special equipment, kind of tires used, defects or marks on the car, etc., in order to aid in quick detection of the car.

The service started some weeks ago, and is now fully established. Recent bulletins carry from 60 to 75 car descriptions. Several stolen cars have

already been located through this means.
 In case a stolen car is found, a report by the police officer finding it is to be made at once to the Secretary of State, who will notify the police authorities in the city from which the car was taken. Report of stolen cars for use in the bulletin are received from police authorities and sheriffs from all parts of the State. Secretary Emerson believes that this system will be of great benefit in securing the return of stolen cars and in apprehending automobile thieves.

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
