MILLION DOLLARS IS NEEDED TO PAY MOTHERS' PENSIONS

By Judge Henry Neil, Father of Mothers' Pensions, of Hinsdale, Illinois.

The next Illinois legislature will be asked to appropriate a million dollars to be distributed to each county in proportion to the amount of its Mothers' Pension roll.

The last legislature of the State of Pennsylvania appropriated a million dollars to be used in this way.

Joel D. Hunter, head of the Chicago United Charities and Morris Karpf, head of the Chicago Jewish Charities have just written a report on the need of such an appropriation and of the way in which it should be administered. This report is published for free distribution by the Illinois Department of Public Welfare, Springfield, Illinois.

The Federal Children's Bureau, Washington, D. C., has just published for free distribution a report on the use of the Mothers' Pension law in Illinois, and severe censures all the counties except Cook County.

Judge Victor P. Arnold of the Cook County Juvenile Court, whose pension roll in 1922 will amount to \$750,000 is earnestly advocating this appropriation. Recently he granted a widow with eight children a pension of \$130

Joseph L. Moss, chief probation officer of the Cook County Juvenile Court says that the State of Illinois should pay half of the pensions to mothers in each county, in acknowledgement of its duty to its wards, the dependent children.

The law allows \$10 a month for the mother and \$15 a month for each child under fourteen years of age, in Cook County.

In all the other counties the law allows \$5 a month for the mother and \$10 a month for each child under fourteen years of age.

Illinois was the first to enact a State-wide Mothers' Pension law which was introduced into the Legislature of 1911 by myself. This State should now take the lead in its efficient administration. Forty states now have this law and over \$15,000,000 a year is being paid to these mothers.

I have visited every city in Great Britain in 1918-1919 and in South Africa in 1920 advocating adequate Mothers' Pensions. This year the Parliament of South Africa enacted a law to give mothers of dependent children out of State funds a sum sufficient to enable them to give all of

their time to the care of their own children.

People who favor this system of caring for widows and orphans and are willing to add their influence toward getting this million dollars appropriated are invited to write and tell me so.
