

CHRISTMAS SEAL CAMPAIGN TO BE PUSHED BY ASSN.

Funds to Fight Great White Plague Will be Used in DuPage If Raised Here.

During the present year, the DuPage County Tuberculosis Society was formed. The society was organized at the suggestion and under the direction of the Illinois Tuberculosis Association and is in affiliation with the state association, which is the center body directing the state-wide campaign against tuberculosis. For the first time DuPage County has an organized body through which well directed and effective efforts can be made against this prevalent and so often fatal disease.

The executive committee of the DuPage County society consist of:

1. President.
2. Vice-President.
3. Secretary.
4. Treasurer.
5. Representative from the DuPage County Federation of Women's Clubs.
6. Superintendent of the DuPage County Schools.
7. Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County.
8. Chairman of the Tuberculosis Committee of the Board of Supervisors.
9. County Judge of DuPage County.
10. Chairman of the DuPage County Bar Association.
11. DuPage County Commander of the American Legion.
12. Chairman of the County Press Association.

The work for the coming year has been carefully outlined and much thought has been given to the selection of that type of a plan best suited to the needs peculiar to the local conditions of this county. In a county like DuPage, with a suburban and rural character and where convenient transportation facilities between many of the larger towns are inadequate or wholly lacking, it has been decided that the most feasible and practical plan will be to limit the campaign to a restricted territory and for the society not to make as its initial efforts, an attempt to extend its activities over the entire county.

The work outlined for the first year will, then, be in the nature of a dem-

onstration which will show definitely and concretely the prevalence of tubercular conditions of the school children in the district in which the work is undertaken.

The result of this work can be accepted as an index of these conditions as they exist throughout the county as a whole.

In limiting the field of the work, it has been thought that a more efficient working organization can be formed and more complete and definite results obtained, and, further, that the organization can be so developed as to permit of its rapid expansion, so that its activities can be applied to a much larger field.

The work of the society will in large measure be directed toward the prevention and cure of the type of tuberculosis that is found in the child, for it is in this type of the disease that preventive and curative measures are most effective. Also every possible effort will be made in behalf of the sick adult. Especially those open cases who are in our midst and are disseminating the disease through their expectoration containing myriads of tubercle bacilli.

The child—its health—stands out as the most prominent objective of the work of the society.

The origin of this disease, its manner of dissemination, its mortality rate, and the means and measures found to be most effective against this disease by the State Tuberculosis Association as well as by other older agencies working in the field of public health, will be presented in subsequent issues of this paper.

The revenue received from the Christmas sale in DuPage County of the tuberculosis seals and bonds, is the only money available to this society for the carrying on of its work.

His widow, children, one sister, Mrs. Adah Anderson, and a host of friends mourn his taking away.

Mr. Stanley was president of the Suburban Ice Co., which concern he organized in 1908 and it was due to his efforts that a prosperous business has been built up.
