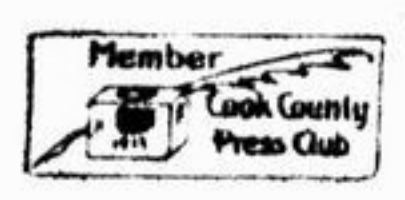

MEMORIAL TREES AND HUNGRY MEN

Here is a contrast which cannot be otherwise than make people think. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are being spent in almost every community in the United States for "Memorial Trees" to commemorate the memory of those who laid down their lives in the great war. We believe in the idea, believe that it is better to plant a tree than to erect a marble slab, but just a little glance on the other side—

Walk down Madison street, Chicago, the great thoroughfare of the unemployed. Watch the lapel buttons of the young fellows there, jobless, hungry, miserable, see how many of them wear on their coat the insignia of the "U. S." in the center of the little bronze button which denotes that they served in the army during the great conflict which ended three years ago. Talk with them, see for yourself how many there are; how they go hungry to sleep in Grant Park because they haven't the price of a twenty-five cent "flop." Ask them why they aren't working, note the proportion which say that their jobs were gone when they returned, and they have not been able to get a steady one since.

Here is the place for money to go now. Take care of these jobless, hungry men. They, by shouldering a rifle, took care of you in the days of 1917-18. The planting of memorial trees can await the time when conditions are better, those who gave their lives would be the first to say to this "Amen."

PARKING AT THE DEPOT

One of the necessary improvements in the village is a street cutting thru the station "Park" north of the tracks from Main to Washington. Efforts have been made by the village officials to have the street cut through by the "Q" but they have not been able to get together on the proposition.

This does not take away the danger from the large number of cars which park on North Main street, especially between the hours of 5:30 to 6:30. Sometimes there are so many cars there at this time that it is almost impossible for traffic to get through.

Park your car on the south side of Warren avenue, between Forest and Highland. In this way cars will be only on the one side of the street, and that which is not occupied by dwelling or business places, and it would do away entirely with the congestion north of the tracks.
