

FIRST CONVENTION LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS NEXT WEEK

Mrs. Harriet P. Parish, President of Local Branch, Gives Report Tuesday Morning.

The first annual convention of the Illinois League of Women Voters will be held next week Monday and Tuesday in the Florentine Room of the Congress Hotel. Mrs. Harriet P. Parish, President of the local branch, will give a report of the activities of the Downers Grove women at the session at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday morning.

In connection with the convention of the league, and continuing through the week will be other conferences and meetings which hold a peculiar interest for women who are now interesting themselves in the affairs of government.

On Wednesday will be held the 4th Regional Conference. Progress and methods of organization will be told by the chairman of the states leagues of women voters from Illinois, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

December 1, 2 and 3, will be held the "Institute in the Department of Efficiency in Government" of the National League of Women Voters. Among the speakers will be some of the men most prominent in the affairs of the country. Some of these will be Chas. E. Merriam, University of Chicago; P. Orman Ray, Northwestern University; Palston Hayden, University of Michigan; A. R. Hatton, Western Reserve University; Walter Millard, Proportional Representation League.

These men will speak on various phases of the election of candidates, the ballot forms, the legislation regarding election machinery and other things in connection with the choosing of officials, both local, state and national.

A year has passed since the Illinois League of Women Voters was first organized. At that time opposing forces prompted by the strongly partisan spirit always abroad before a presidential election, strove to do away with the organization of a League. The vision and courage, however, of those who more fully understood the objects and need of such an organization controlled the situation and the Illinois League of Women Voters was born.

The work in the pioneer year of a new organization is seldom easy of accomplishment and the history of the League in Illinois is no exception. Obstacles, however, are a test of strength and steadily but slowly the League has progressed during its first year. Several Citizenship Schools have been conducted in various parts of the state; scores of lectures on citizenship have been given before organizations. County and local Leagues have been organized. Assistance has been given to large numbers of program chairmen. Trained teachers have been secured and a general program of education and legislation has steadily gone forward. The fact that the league is now established, that it has power, the power of itself service, is evidence that an ideal born of a great vision can never die.


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
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
