Commissioner Heartt presented the following ordinance and moved for its passage.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE ANNEXATION OF CERTAIN TERRITORY TO THE VILLAGE OF DOWNERS GROVE.

WHEREAS, It appears to the Council of the Village of Downers Grove, County of DuPage and State of Illinois, that heretofore a petition was presented to it for the annexation of certain contiguous territory, the external boundaries of which are as follows, to-wit:
That part of Section 7, Township 38 North, Range 11 East of the third Principal Meridian lying west of the present limits of the Village of Downers Grove described as follows: beginning on the North line of said Section 7 at the Northwest corner of the present limits of said Village; thence along the North line of said Section 7 to the center line of Lee Avenue as shown on the plat of Branagar Brothers Wooded Homesites, as recorded in the Recorder's Office of DuPage County, Illinois, thence South along the center line of said Lee Avenue extended to the South line of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad (Right of Way); thence east along said Right of Way to the Easterly boundary line of Forest Preserve Property; thence southerly along said Forest Preserve to the North-west corner of Lot 7 Block 2, Maple Grove Addition to Downers Grove; thence Easterly along North line of Lot 6 Block 2, Maple Grove Addition; thence south along the West line of Lot 6 Block 2 to the Southerly boundary of said Maple Grove Addition; thence Easterly along said Southerly boundary to the Southwest corner of Lot 81 of the Assessor's Subdivision of Sections 7 & 8; thence Easterly along the Southerly line of said Lot 81 to the present Western boundary of the Village of Downers Grove; thence North along said Western boundary to the place of beginning.

AND WHEREAS, It further appears that the question of said annexation was submitted to the local voters of said Village at a general election held in and for said Village on the 17th day of September A. D. 1921, and that a majority of all the votes cast at said election were in favor of said annexation and that said petition and the election held in accordance with the statutes in such case made and provided THEREFORE:

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of said Village of Downers Grove:

SECTION 1. That the territory herein described be and hereby is annexed to the Village of Downers Grove, in the County of DuPage and State of Illinois.

SECTION 2. That the Mayor of said Village of Downers Grove, be and he is hereby directed to file a certified copy of this ordinance in the office of the Recorder of Deeds of the said County of DuPage, as directed in and by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois entitled, "An act to provide for annexing and excluding territory, and to unite cities, towns and villages," approved April 10th, 1872, in force July 1, 1872, and all amendments thereto or supplemental thereto.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, as provided by law.

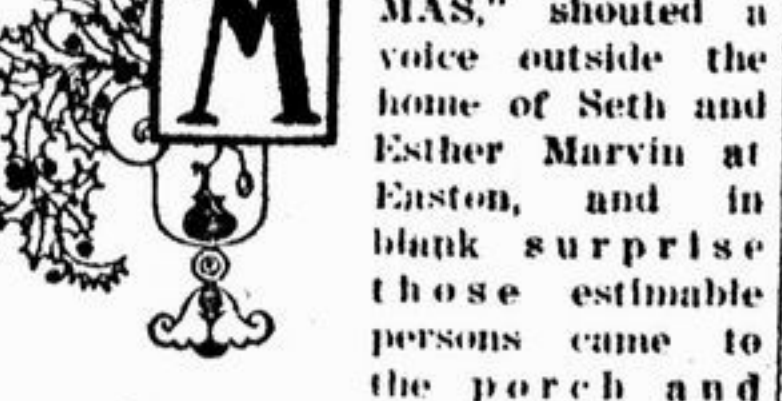
