KLEIN FOUND GUILTY

BURGLARS BREAK INTO MC ALLISTER STORE-TAKE SAFE

Officer Edgeton Finds Rear Door Open While Making His Rounds Early This Morning

Burglars broke into the McAllister dry goods store early this morning, carried away the safe and disarranged the stock of goods on the shelves. The correct amount of the loss is not known as what was taken away in addition to the safe will not be learned until a check of the stock is made.

Night officer Wm. Edgeton says it was done between three and four as everything was all right when he made the rounds of the business houses at three. At four o'clock he discovered that the night light was no longer burning and an investigation revealed the fact that the back door had been broken open. The telephone wires were cut and goods piled all over the store in confusion.

Edgeton called C. C. Parks, manager of the store, who discovered the loss of the safe. Not very much cash is missing but papers and books of no value to any one but the firm were kept in the strong box.

The McAllister company has offered a reward of fifty dollars for the return of these books and papers.

It is thought that expert outside talent was responsible for the robbery, the first in the village in a long time.

MINIATURE "ART INSTITUTE" IS AT GROVE ST. SCHOOL

Exceptional Exhibition of Colored Prints and Photos Open to the Public.

An exceptional exhibition of colored prints and photographs is taking place in Downers Grove under the auspices of the Kindergarten Extension Association. The great majority of the 130 pictures are hung in the Junior Elementary School, some of them at the Public Library, and one in each room of the North and South Side Schools.

The pictures have been assembled and are circulated by the American Federation of Arts of New York City. Many of the subjects are suitable for the decoration of homes and schools, and American subjects outnumber all the others combined, but excellent examples of prints in color are shown from England, Germany, Sweden and Switzerland.

The pictures are purchasable and range in price from \$4.00 to \$25.00. The majority sell for \$10.00 or less.

In order to give every one in the village an opportunity to enjoy a small "Art Institute" in our midst the Junior Elementary School will be open from 2:30 to 6:00 o'clock Saturday and Sunday afternoon of this week and next, December 10 and 11, 17 and 18.

Verdict Returned at 10:15: Defense Attorneys in Plea for New Trial: Hearing Friday

"Guilty of murder and not less than fourteen years in the penitentiary" is the verdict of the jury in the case of the People vs. Jacob Klein for the killing of Leo Neumann, of Chicago, on Sunday night, September 25, on a lonely road south-east of Downers Grove.

This verdict was read by the clerk of the Circuit court who was handed the jury's verdict by Foreman Fred Towsley at 10:15 this morning.

Attorney for the defense immediately moved for a new trial and the hearing will be held before Judge Irwin at 10:00 o'clock next Friday morning. Attorney Gunsul is talking to Klein after the verdict said, "Don't worry, the fight has just begun."

Spectators thronged the court as the jury filed in and the two weeks suspension was brought to an end. The trial drew the attention of the surrounding country and news of the trial was eagerly sought for. Klein is a deputy sheriff and the defense made its case on the presumption that he fired the fatal shot while in the performance of his duties.

The ballots were taken as follows: On the first the entire jury found him guilty. The second and succeeding votes were on the degree of his guilt.

The first ballot was equal; six for murder and six for manslaughter.

The other ballots were,

- 2. Murder 6 Manslaughter 6
- 3. Murder 6 Manslaughter 6
- 4. Murder 8 Manslaughter 4
- 5. Murder 6 Manslaughter 6
- 6. Murder 9 Manslaughter 3
- Murder 12

An agreement was reached on the seventh ballot, all favoring the murderer and one more ballot was taken to fix the penalty, all agreeing on the sentence on the first count.

The verdict of the jury came as the culmination of just a weeks hearing of evidence and pleas of counsel for the state and the defense. The verdict was a surprise to both, and they showed it when it was read.

States Attorney Reed and special prosecutor Rusch Kerney, of Naperville, made their pleas to the jury this day afternoon. Reed especially made a hit with the spectators by his clear logic and his interpretation of the evidence.

Former States attorney Chas. W. Hadley made the first plea for the defense at the opening of court yesterday morning. Mr. Hadley is an orator of ability and he pulled out all the emotional stops in his system in a great soliloquy to the jurymen. All over court people surreptitiously wiped tears from their eyes as Hadley drew a picture of Jacob Klein, the wronged, the innocent. The defendant broke down completely and at one time the court bailiff was forced to rap for order.

Hadley was followed by Harvey Gunsul of Aurora, the noted criminal attorney and the legal light on which the hopes of the defense had been pinned. Gunsul, if he did not sway the jury by his arguments, certainly did the spectators. And they were there in great numbers, crowding the court room to the doors to hear the case which has set DuPage and surrounding counties abeam.

Special assistant states attorney, T. Harry Slusser, of Chicago, formerly of Downers Grove, was the final speaker. He summed up the case for the state in a manner which has seldom been equalled and never surpassed in the history of the Circuit court of the county.

His clear logic, his ringing tones, as he demanded that justice be done and the roads made safe for the motorist will live long in the minds of those who heard him. Mr. Slusser asked that justice be done not only the defendant but the widow and the fatherless child.

The case, which has attracted attention all around Chicago, was the shooting of Leo Neumann, of 2237 W. 20th street, Chicago, on the evening of Sunday, Sept. 25, by Jacob Klein, DuPage county deputy sheriff, on the Plainfield road, south of East Grove.

Neumann, his wife and their thirteen year old daughter were invited by Mr. and Mrs. Gust Vorreyer to motor to Barber's Corners for a week end visit with the Ed. Schroeder family there. Mrs. Neumann is a sister of Mr. Vorreyer.

They made the trip, five of them, in a Ford roadster, leaving the farm home for a trip back to Chicago, about 7:40 Sunday night. They traveled east on the Plainfield road and as they passed the Schreider home, they saw a man walking down the road toward them. He was recognized by the occupants of the car as Klein.

As the front of the machine neared him, Klein shouted something which sounded like halt, and as the machine passed him a shot was heard. Neumann tightened out, precipitating Mrs. Vorreyer, who had been sitting on his lap, into the road. The bullet entered the back of the machine and plowed its way into Neumann.

Vorreyer drove to the W. E. Anderson.
