Is an Atom Like a Clock?

Sir Joseph Larmor has suggested that an atom may be analogous to a clock. The outer electron system of the atom, on which its chemical and spectroscopic properties depend, and which has certain definite rates of oscillation, would correspond to the pendulum, or better, to a compound pendular system of a clock, he says. The inner core of the atom is similar to the spring of a clock, which, by means of the escapement, slowly imparts its energy to the pendulum in a jerky fashion.
