To Clean Varnished Paint.
Never clean varnished paint or enamel with soap or with soda and water. This makes the varnish dull, and it may even cause it to peel away from the wood. A better plan is to use a solution prepared with tea leaves. Collect the leaves and put them in a basin. Pour hot water over them and allow them to soak for ten minutes. Use the liquid cold for washing over the varnished surfaces. Finally dry and polish with a soft cloth.
