COMMUNICATION

Walter J. Staats, Editor, Reporter:

At our regular meeting held Wednesday night, several of the boys brought up the report of the Lempe fire as printed in a DuPage county newspaper. A motion was made and passed that I write a report and ask you to print it correcting the statement which was as follows: "As usual, the firemen lost several minutes locating the scene of the fire."

This is an injustice, not only to the firemen but to the telephone operators through whom the alarm is given.

The facts are, when a call is made at the telephone office for "Number 0" the girls have always set aside all other calls and immediately notified the power plant AND as many of the firemen as possible.

At about 7:30 the morning of the Lempe fire, I and others received the message, "Fire at 143 E. Maple avenue." I had run two blocks when the whistle blew, and it was not over 15 seconds after it blew that the truck with four firemen aboard, left the fire house going south on Main street to Maple avenue and then direct to the Lempe home. I doubt if it took a full minute from the time the whistle blew to the time the truck arrived at the fire.
