This organization met several weeks ago at Wheaton to discuss the possibilities. A vote was taken and the count stood seven for and seven against the proposition. In an effort to break the deadlock, they met again Saturday and the ballot showed fourteen favorable to having a Du Page county woman make the race and ten unfavorable.

Mrs. Wm. F. Jensen, president of the Womans Club of Glen Ellyn and a prominent worker in county church circles, was given the chance to make the race.
