New Ford Agent Opens

Milwaukee will have its own authorized Ford dealer, according to announcement made last week that a new company, the Verdenius-Robinson Motor company, will open in Milwaukee in that capacity within a few days. This section has hitherto been handled by the Portland dealers. The new company has secured temporary quarters in the building just east of the Milwaukee office, and will be located there until permanent quarters are ready.

Both members of the new Ford firm are experienced automobile men. Thomas A. Verdenius is president of the company and is a newcomer to Portland, having been in the automobile business in the east. Herbert Robinson, who is treasurer of the company, is well known in Ford circles here, having been sales manager for Tatbot & Casey, one of the oldest of the local Ford agents, for some time past.

The new company has under consideration four building sites and expects to close for one of the sites soon. As soon as the site is secured work on the construction of a large and up-to-date garage will start, the men stated. The new building, it is expected, will be ready for occupancy early in 1922.
