No matter how much gas you burn, you cannot raise the temperature of water on your gas range above 212 degrees Fahrenheit, or boiling point. Therefore, once the pot starts to boil on the range, reduce the flame. This effects a saving.
Also remember that it takes no more gas to cook twelve potatoes than it does to cook six. Plan to have whole boiled or mashed potatoes the first day and creamed potatoes the second. Creamed potatoes, made from left-over cold boiled potatoes cut into cubes and reheated in a white sauce, are delicious. Again, plan your baking so as to get the most possible use out of the oven. When roasting a piece of meat, scrub, wipe dry and grease some potatoes. Place these in the oven on a pan and bake. When done, cut them in half lengthwise, scoop out the white portion and mix it with milk, butter and seasoning. Then pack it back into the shells, place in the broiler and toast until browned.
