Side Entrance for Cars Will be on the East of Building—Fire House is in the Way.

Plans are now under way for the remodeling of the Kidwell Garage Company's building at Main street and Warren avenue.

The entire front of the place, on Warren, will be changed. The large double doors for the cars, will be moved from the front of the building to the east side. A modern storefront will be put in place of the doors and a large sales and auto accessories display room, thirty by fifty feet in size, will run straight across the front of the garage.

It will be necessary to move the small garage, in which the fire truck is now housed, from the lot east of the garage. This is on property belonging to Mr. Kidwell and as soon as arrangements can be completed, either for moving the garage away entirely, or placing it farther back, a cement driveway will be put in. The double garage doors will be about the center of the east side and will give access to the main garage floor as at present.

An entire stock of accessories, such as tires, tubes, jacks, chains, lights of all kinds, and the many devices for the convenience and safety of the motorist, will be carried. It is planned to start work on the project within the next month.

Downers Grove Boy Makes Good as City Manager of Ontario and Rises in Business.
