"Q" REDUCES SUMMER RATES WEST

Announces Tourist Fares to Colorado Region Will be Twenty Per Cent Lower.

Announcement was made today at the general offices of the Burlington Railroad that the Burlington, Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railways had decided to make a substantial reduction in summer tourist fares to Colorado, the national parks and other resorts in the Rocky Mountain region.

P. S. Eustis, Passenger Traffic Manager of the Burlington, estimated that the reduction would approximate 20 per cent and that it would in effect restore the fare which was effective prior to the big increase made in 1920.

STATE SECRETARY TO ENFORCE MOTOR LAW REGULATIONS

Louis L. Emerson Launches Campaign to Secure Enforcement of Present Laws.

Declaring that failure to comply with state automobile headlight regulations is responsible for a large percentage of the accidents on the public highways, Secretary of State Louis L. Emerson has launched a campaign to secure enforcement of the law. He is emphasizing particularly the provisions regarding dimming.

Automobile investigators appointed by him have been instructed to use the power given them by the last legislature, and make arrests where ever they find violations of the law. He has also sent a letter to sheriffs and police officers throughout the state, and calling their attention to the provisions of the law, and asking their cooperation in its strict enforcement.

The State law provides that every automobile must be equipped with two lights in front and a red light in the rear, which must be lighted

when the car is in operation, any time from one hour after sunset to sunrise. The headlights must be strong enough to be visible for a distance of at least 200 feet, and unless equipped with an anti-glare device or lenses which prevent a glaring or dazzling light, they must be dimmed or extinguished when within 250 feet of an automobile approaching from the opposite direction. No car must be parked at night without a light in front and one in the rear, except where permitted by provision of city ordinance. Statistics show that hundreds of serious accidents happen every year through failure to observe this law. The most common offense is failure to dim glare lights on approaching

another automobile. In many communities this provision of the law is almost totally ignored, and practically nowhere is it consistently observed. Only last week a St. Charles woman was killed on the cement highway between that town and Elgin as a result of blinding headlights.

The woman was walking from one farm to another at the time. The brilliant lights of a machine coming toward her blinded the driver of one approaching her from the rear. She being entirely unconscious of any vehicle coming from behind, was struck down, and died on the way to Elgin.


