

**HUGE "Q" MAIL TERMINAL TAKES DEFINITE SHAPE**

**Six Story, \$3,000,000 Building For Handling Mail to be Most Complete in World.**

The seemingly endless forest of steel posts and girders which is being added to the skyline on the west side of the river, just south of Van Buren street, is the \$3,000,000 mail terminal building, a part of the new Union Station improvement.

This immense building is 800 feet long, 75 feet wide, six stories high, contains almost seven acres of floor space and the 40-foot driveway along the entire east front will provide tail gate space for 88 mail vans at one time, while in the sub-basement truckage facilities are being provided for forty 60-foot mail cars at platform space for loading or unloading at one time.

When completed, this mail terminal building will be the most complete and largest in the world. Lighted from all four sides, it will be equipped with the latest mechanical devices for the efficient and expeditious handling of mail. Forming a connecting link between the railroads of the East and the Burlington, it is speeding up effect on the movement of transcontinental mail between the Atlantic and the Pacific should be noticeable immediately.


