Town Clerk, Highway Commissioner and Supervisor Up for Re-Election

The annual township primary election tomorrow, Saturday, March 11, promises to be a rather warm one. The several candidates in the field for the job of Highway Commissioner make this possible as all are making determined fights for the place.

The other offices to be filled are; assistant supervisor; assessor and town clerk. The present men holding the jobs are W. H. Blodgett, George Ruchty and John Hall. Neither of them has any opposition. Two Hinsdale men are seeking Chas. K. Roe's place as highway commissioner. Louis Eidman, whose accident several years ago forced him to retire from the mason contracting business and Henry Leibundguth, a Hinsdale teaming contractor. Both men have the support of a wide acquaintance.

commissioner, refers to his record as a recommendation to the voters. Since the voting of the hard road tax the volume of work entrusted to the highway commissioner has grown in magnitude and importance. Today over \$50,000 are expended annually on the roads of this township. Much of the road program is in its first stages and the coming summer will see real results from the hard road tax. During the past year Mr. Roe has hard surfaced many roads in all sections of the township and as soon as Ogden avenue cement road is finished the permanent improvement of the Downers Grove-Hinsdale road will be resumed.

The \$32,000 hard roads fund available last summer has been spent entirely on the roads specified at the special election voting the tax and the general funds has taken care of the lesser laterals and the Joliet and Plainfield roads. Madison street, in Hinsdale, has been hard surfaced under Mr. Roe's supervision south to the county line at Byrneville. Those close to matters in the township earnestly urge the return of Mr. Roe to office as a competent and honest highway commissioner.

Knotted Cords Make Noisy Lines The cloth-covered cord which connects your telephone instrument with the bell box and the cord running to the telephone receiver are each made up of a number of fine wires covered with light insulation. If these cords were not made in this way they would not be flexible. They are necessarily delicate and easily put out of order by misuse. Subscribers are requested to avoid twisting and knotting the telephone cords as this wears through the insulation, breaks the fine wires and causes short circuits.
