### GOVERNOR SMALL DESIGNATES BIRD AND ARBOR DAYS

April 14 and October 27 Set Aside for Annual Observation by Proclamation.

Governor Len Small today issued the following proclamation for the observance of Arbor and Bird days on April 14 and October 27.

"The laws of Illinois provide that the Governor shall, annually, in the Spring, designate a day or days to be known as "ARBOR AND BIRD DAY."

"The trees and the birds of any land constitute a part of its natural wealth, and their aesthetic value is as highly important to the people as their economic value. They minister to and delight the senses. Our trees preserve our lands from erosion, they furnish us with the fruits of the earth, and with lumber to house us, and with fuel to warm us, and their grateful shade shields us from the blazing sun of summer.

Our birds, subsisting largely upon insect pests, protect the growing trees and crops and thus add materially to the wealth of the State, besides contributing to our pleasure by their bright plumage and sweet songs. It is quite essential that our youth from time to time be impressed with the necessity of propagating and fostering these important natural resources.

"Now, therefore, I, Len Small, Governor of Illinois, by virtue of the authority in me vested by the statutes, do hereby designate Friday, April the fourteenth, and Friday October the twenty-seventh, of the present year, as Arbor and Bird days, to be observed throughout the State by planting and care of trees, shrubs, and vines about the homes, on the farms, along the highways, and about public grounds within this State, and as

days on which to hold appropriate exercises in the public schools and elsewhere to emphasize the importance to our State of the propagation of trees, shrubs and vines, and the preservation of our native birds."

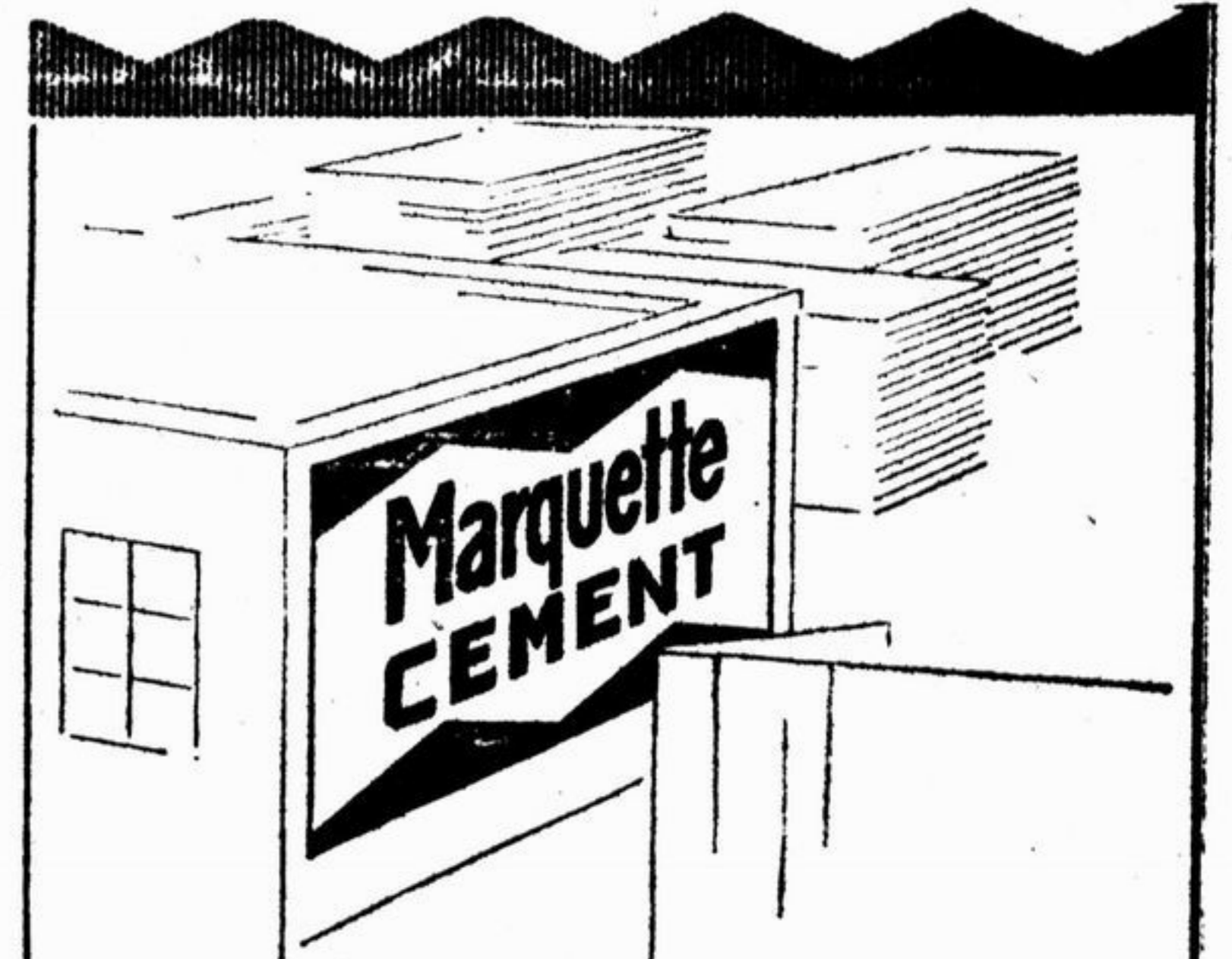
