

**What Number Did You Call?**

It is often a difficult problem to get directory numbers for your telephone, and unless you are just a subscriber, it is almost impossible to get a connection which does not disconcerting if the calling subscriber has to say the number has been disconnected. It is necessary for the operator to pass these calls to another operator, who checks the number and then advises you in turn of the error. This is a costly and time consuming service.

He First Loved Us.

John 3: 1-17.

Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end. And supper being ended, the devil having now put into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, Jesus knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he was come from God, and went to God; he riseth from supper, and laid aside his garments; and took a towel, and girded himself. After that he poureth water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel wherewith he was girded. Then cometh he to Simon Peter: and Peter saith unto him, Lord, dost thou wash my feet? Jesus answered and said unto him, what I do thou knowest not now; but thou shalt know hereafter. Peter saith unto him, Thou shalt never wash my feet. Jesus answered him, If I wash thee not, thou hast no part with me. Simon Peter saith unto him, Lord, not my feet only, but also my hands and my head. Jesus saith unto him, He that is washed needeth not to wash his feet, but is clean every whit; and ye are clean, but not all. For ye know who should betray him; therefore said he, Ye are not all clean. So after he had washed their feet, and had taken his garments, and was set down again, he said unto them, Know ye what I have done to you? Ye call me Master and Lord; and ye say well; for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet, ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you. Verily, verily, I say unto you, The servant is not greater than his Lord; neither he that is sent greater than he that sent him. If ye know these things happy are ye if ye do them.

those who are "called out" from among the masses, a body of Christian believers who have accepted Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and who are bound together by a Confession of Faith for the Worship of God; for Fellowship with one another, and for Service to the end that the Kingdom of God may be established upon earth.

Writs Served at Church Door.

Until the middle of the Seventeenth century a familiar figure at a Virginia church door on a Sunday morning was the county sheriff. The law requiring attendance at divine worship was of great assistance to him. It rounded up the planters and small farmers from remote corners and enabled him with a minimum of effort to serve writs, warrants, summonses, executions and similar official papers.

This practical method disgusted the planters who did not fully appreciate the use of such an occasion. So, in 1658, they passed a law prohibiting the service of official papers on Sunday, at the parish church or elsewhere, and the sheriff was sent off on his web of trails the other six days to do as well as he might.

Chinese Wear Stoves.

Chinese women wear practically the same clothes in winter as in summer. In the most severe weather, however, they wear heading baskets under their cloaks.

These baskets are plain wicker ones, such as we use for nests. Inside the baskets charcoal warmers are placed. They will radiate heat for hours.

The charcoal is mixed with chemicals that generate oxygen, and thus the charcoal will burn constantly, even though it is sealed in the container.
