against him and finally learning that his threats could accomplish nothing said "he would probably bring out another candidate for the same office" that would "be practical" since that time a new candidate was put in the field at the last minute and this same "old ringer" is throwing his full support back on him. The inference to be made is obvious.

The question for DuPage County's independent voters to decide is how far they will allow themselves to be deluded by this breed of politician?

Another candidate was approached with a proposition by another "ringer" to determine what concessions would be made, provided a certain candidate withdrawal could be effected—the same emphatic "nothing doing" answer was given. Many other cases have developed along similar lines, every one of them prompted by selfish motives that could not result in good to the public interests.

False Rumors.

With these maneuvers has come the flood of canards, false rumors and their tribe of accompaniments. For example—the statement was made that one candidate might be a lawyer, but he had never tried a case—the facts were that out of sixteen years practising law for five years he had served as trial lawyer for the largest firm of attorneys west of New York. Another statement circulated to the effect that the candidate was put up and supported by a man who had the general reputation of being one of the celebrated Wheaton ring, when the facts showed that there was absolutely not the least foundation for such an assumption. Another statement was made to the effect that a certain candidate was a slacker—this man was seriously wounded performing a heroic act at the front.

This all leads to the main point of this article.

The New Note.

A new note is being struck—and it is up to the independent thinking tax payers of DuPage County to demonstrate what the response will be. It
