FEDERAL GAME WARDEN MERRILL HAS GOOD REPORT

Says Ducks and Geese are Increasing and Migratory Game Bird Law is Responsible

There is good news for sportsmen in the report U. S. Game Warden B. G. Merrill brought to his home in Hinsdale last Friday after a five week trip through southern Illinois enforcing the Federal migratory game bird treaty.

He stated that there has been a great increase in wild ducks and wild geese and a better observance of the law this spring than in other years. During the trip he apprehended fifteen offenders, including some market hunters. Mr. Merrill also says the State authorities are co-operating with the Federal authorities in every way.

This is good news to the sportsmen of the community who like duck hunting about as well as anything.
