1st EVANGELICAL ANNUAL MEETING LAST WEDNESDAY

Congregation Votes to Adopt "Unified Finance System"—Splendid Reports.
The annual congregational business meeting of the First Evangelical Church was held in the church parlors on Wednesday evening, March 29th. A short program was rendered before the business session.

As the folks gathered in Mr. J. L. Lehmann led them in the singing of a number of rousing hymns. A humorous play with a great lesson entitled, "The Anybody Family on a Sunday Morning" was skillfully rendered by a group of seven and enlisted many a hearty laugh as the folks found their own actions so humanly depicted. The male quartette furnished several selections and the Haller sisters favored with a piano duet, while the ladies served ice cream and cakes.

The reports submitted by the leaders of the various departments of the church were most encouraging, particularly those of the Sunday School, Ladies Aid and Missionary Auxiliary. The summarized financial report showed the gross receipts of the church for the year ending March 31, 1922 to be \$4,516.05. This represents an increase of \$953.05 or 27% over last year and an increase of \$1,986.15 or 78% over the second year preceding. In the beginning of the year the purchase of a lot with 60 feet frontage and thoroughly modern six room house added a splendid paragon to the holdings of the congregation.

The pastor's report showed a busy year of varied endeavor and revealed a splendid increase in the adult membership of the church during the year. The future looks very promising and the officers elected to fill various vacancies assumed their responsibilities with the intention of making them serve as opportunities for leadership which will make possible reports of similar encouragement when the congregation gathers for its next annual business session on the first Wednesday evening after Thanksgiving Day.
