

LA GRANGE CHOIR SINGS AT SAINT ANDREWS SUNDAY

Male Choristers Under Direction of William Ripley Dorr Furnish Music in Afternoon.

Next Sunday afternoon, April 9, there will be a special service at St. Andrew's Mission, at which the Rev. C. M. Andrews, rector of St. Timothy's Church, Chicago, will be the preacher, and a musical program will be given by forty boys and men from Emmanuel Choir of LaGrange, under the direction of William Ripley Dorr.

Included in these are the choruses, "Blissed Jesu, Fount of Mercy," from the oratorio, "Stabat Mater," by Dvorak, and "Jesu, Word of God Incarnate," a setting of English text to the "Ave Verum" of Gounod. The former opens with the main theme sung by the basses, accompanied by the other parts, working up gradually to a fine climax. The second will be sung unaccompanied. Both are particularly appropriate for Lent.

"Send Forth Thy Spirit" is an English setting of the great "Emittit Spiritum Tuum" of Joseph Schuetky, a seven part unaccompanied number which was much sung by the Paulist Choristers under Father Finn. It has been sung many times by Emmanuel Choir in their various concerts and is considered by many the finest number of its kind in the Choir's repertory because of the richness and beauty of its harmony and because it brings out the brilliance of the boys' voices so effectively.

More familiar are the duet from Stainer's "Crucifixion," which will be sung by A. C. Grant, tenor, and Blake,

H. Wilson, baritone, and the unaccompanied chorus, "God so loved the World," sung by all choirs everywhere.

Typical of the Russian school of sacred music is the "Cherubic Hymn" by Gretchaninoff, a beautiful piece of eight part writing for unaccompanied voices.

\$25,000 DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST A. L. HAWKER
