

DRAMATIC SOCIETY OF SCHOOL PLAYS "GREEN STOCKINGS"

Famous Play to be Presented at the Assembly Hall Next Monday Evening.

The dramatic society of the high school will present the play "Green Stockings" in the high school assembly next Monday night at 8 o'clock. This play is the work of A. E. W. Mason, an English author of note. The leading part in the professional production in this country was played successfully for a number of years in New York by Miss Margaret Anglin. The story of the play centers about the old country custom in England which required that an elder sister must wear green stockings at the wedding of her younger sister if that younger sister captured a husband first.

Celia Farady, the eldest daughter of the Farady family of London has had to put on green stockings twice at ready at the weddings of her younger sisters, Madge and Evelyn, and it looks as though she will have to wear them a third time at the wedding of the youngest sister Phyllis. The situations presented in the Farady family are very ridiculous and offer some splendid comedy throughout. The part of Celia Farady played so successfully by Margaret Anglin will be taken by Margaret Kolm. Miss Celia's three younger sisters, Madge, Evelyn and Phyllis will be played by Marjorie Whiffen, Helen Lewis and Neleeta Miskelly.

James Mitchell will play the part of Wm. Farady, father of the Farady girls. Living with the Farady family is an aunt, Mrs. Chisholm Farady of Chicago. She is known in the family as Aunt Ida and her part will be played by Florida Waples. Robert Tarver is an empty headed young swell—very much attached to Miss Phyllis. Ellis worth Bogart will play the part of Tarver. The leading male character in the play is Colonel Smith, a colonel in the British army in Africa. Colonel Smith's part will be played by Howard Wilhelm. Attached to the Farady family are an old retired Admiral Grice-Richard Drees, and two young men interested in Celia, James Raleigh and Henry Steele—Wiltred Pape and Elmer O'Neill. Anton Broberg will play the part of a dignified family servant.

The cast of the play has been working unusually hard the past few weeks and the production gives promise of being a success. The proceeds from the play will be given to the senior class to aid in financing the high school annual. The price of admission will be thirty-five cents.

DO YOU OWN YOUR OWN BOY?

When speaking before audiences advocating Mothers' Pensions I am often asked the question "Would it not be better for the widowed mother of the dependent children to rear her own boys independently of state aid?"

My reply to this question is, that no mother owns her own boys, and if there is a mother who thinks she owns her own boys just let her wait until her country is at war and the recruiting officer says to her "Have your boys at the railroad station at seven o'clock tomorrow morning to march to Flanders fields." Then mother! you will know that the state owns your boys.

When the war is over and your boy returns with sightless eyes and the body of the other is delivered at your home draped in the National Flag, the state will say, "Now they are yours."

The pensioned mother of dependent children should be taught that Mothers' Pensions is not a charity but is a small part of the State's obligation to her. The State does not do its duty when it pays her less than an adequate amount.
