The proposed extension is to supply the territory annexed to the village last year which lies east of Fairview avenue and north of Chicago avenue.

This is the second improvement to be really taken up this spring. The other was the water pipe extension and the sewer extension north of Chicago avenue, both of which went through and bids are now being advertised for.

During the thirty minute instruction period Mr. W. W. Heintz told the scouts anew the wonderful meaning of the twelfth law—"Reverence." President F. N. Davis' subject was "Trustworthiness" and the scouts' cheers

marked their appreciation of this talk and of their regard for their West Suburban Council President.

He forcibly drove home to the scouts the value of "Loyalty" and made them realize that that law must be one of the scout watchwords.
